

OREGON FORESTS OPENED TO HUNTERS

Order of Governor Martin
Excludes Lincoln, Curry
and Coos Counties.

SALEM, Oct. 6.—Reopening the Oregon forests with the exception of those in Coos, Curry and Lincoln counties was ordered by Governor Martin in a proclamation issued here yesterday. The proclamation was urged by State Forester Ferguson.

The proclamation carried with it a recommendation that the state game commission reopen the hunting season. Hunters would not be allowed to enter Coos, Curry or Lincoln counties.

Reopening of the forests was recommended by Ferguson after he had received favorable reports from all sections of the state. Keeping hunters out of Lincoln, Curry and Coos counties was urged by Ferguson as a protection to men now employed in patrolling the fire areas.

Many Areas Damaged
Ferguson said fires might prove more dangerous than fires in those counties at the present time. Reports received by Ferguson indicated that rain had fallen in virtually every section of the state west of the summit of the Cascade mountains.

Governor Martin said a survey of the Coos bay district indicated that approximately 100,000 acres of land were burned over.

"These reports show very little damage to merchantable timber in Coos and Curry counties," Governor Martin said. "The heavy damage to the forest area was confined to reproduction."

A number of the fires were attributed to carelessness on the part of hunters and incendiaries, the governor concluded.

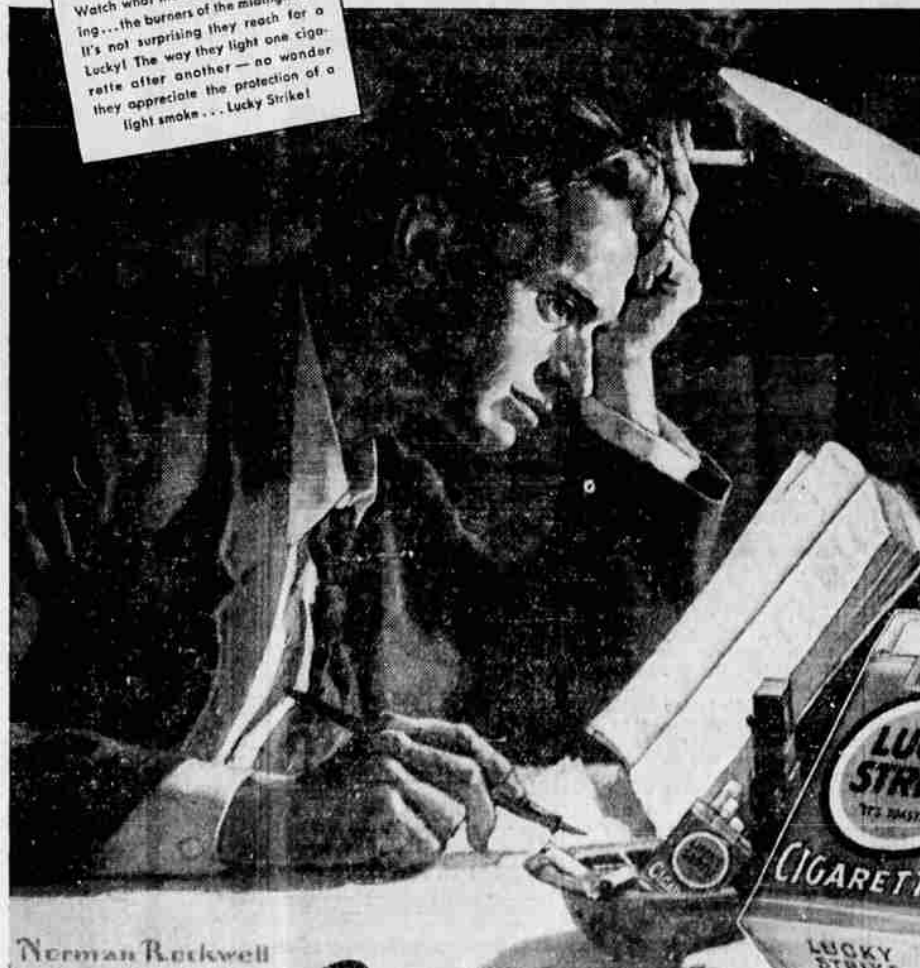
