

CLIPPER POISED FOR PASSENGER FLIGHT

Five-Day Journey to Begin at Alameda, California, End at Manila.

ALAMEDA, Calif., Oct. 7.—(AP)—The sleek China Clipper was fueled today for the 27th Manila airmail departure as five newspapermen awaited takeoff time to go along as passengers over the 8,290-mile air route.

The five-day flight was scheduled to start at 3 p. m. with Honolulu, 2,400 miles distant, destination of the first leg in an overnight voyage.

Officials of Pan-American Airways, which has operated the airmail service since Nov. 22, 1935, viewed the flight as merely another departure for one of their three huge seaplanes, which have completed more than 500,000 miles of flying over the route.

Captain Ralph A. Dahlstrom, veteran of Caribbean skyways, will be in command of the four-motored, 26-ton China Clipper.

The newsmen will view a series of island bases the airline has erected across the Pacific.

These bases are at Midway Island, 1,323 miles northwest of Honolulu; Wake Island, 1,191 miles from Midway, and Guam, which is about 1,500 miles farther along the chain and 4,700 miles from Manila.

Small staffs at these bases service the seaplanes, compile weather reports, and operate the radio beacon which guides the huge sky ships across miles of ocean.

Small hotels already have been made ready to receive passengers who will remain for overnight stops at the island bases when regular passenger service starts.

The only night flying is on the link between here and Honolulu, a flight of from 17 to 20 hours, depending on weather conditions.

The three planes in regular service, the China Clipper, Philippine Clipper and Hawaiian Clipper, are powered by four 550-horsepower engines and cruise between 150 and 160 miles per hour.

Each plane has places for 45 daytime passengers and sleeping accommodations for 18. The crew numbers six.

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LETTUCE STRIKE STILL DEADLOCKED

SALINAS, Calif., Oct. 7.—(AP)—The five-week Salinas lettuce workers' strike today deadlocked against an employers' ultimatum of no compromise on the principal issue—preference in employment for union members.

Employers, represented by three organizations, declared: "We believe 'preferential hiring,' in effect 'closed shop,' obtained through intimidation or force, is against all American principles of business and contrary to American custom and law."

The employers announced their decision in reply to a settlement proposal by Governor Frank P. Merriam of California.
