FAVORITE RECIPES

PRUNE SALAD MRS. N. N. WOOD, Days Creek. Wash 2 dozen prunes, remove pits and soak prunes over night. Mix together 1/2 c cottage cheese, 1/4 t salt, a little pepper, and 1/2 c chopped walnuts and stuff the prunes with this mixture. Place 3 or 4 prunes on lettuce leaf and serve with French dressing made by beating well together 1/2 c salad oil, 2 T lemon juice, 1/2 c pepper and paprika. Pour dressing into bottle and shake well.

BAKED SALMON ROLLS MISS FLORENCE EVERTS, Glendale. Put the contents of 1 can salmon through the food chopper. Add 4 T butter; 1/4 t salt, a little pepper, chili powder and cayenne; 1/2 c bread crumbs; 1 T flour and 1 beaten egg. Mix well and form into small rolls and cover each with a square of pie crust. Pinch the edges together, cut a few slits in the top of each. Brush with beaten egg and bake a golden brown.

MAIDS OF HONOR MRS. H. G. TIBBETTS Lookingglass, Ore. 3/4 c cocoanut; 1/2 c chopped walnuts; 1 c raisins; 1/2 c sugar; 1 T butter; 1 t vanilla; 1 egg; pinch salt. Mix ingredients well. Line cup cake pans or muffin tins with rich pastry. Half fill with mixture and bake in moderate oven. Variation: Currant Tart (old English recipe): 1 egg; 1 c white sugar; 1/2 c butter; 1 c currants. Proceed as above.—Mrs. L. S. Taylor, Roseburg.

BROWN SUGAR FUDGE MRS. CURTIS McCALL, Wilbur WILMA ELLISON, Days Creek. 1 1/2 cups brown sugar 1 1/2 cups white sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup cream 1/2 teaspoon soda 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup coarsely chopped nuts Melt butter, add sugar, cream and soda. Stir until sugar is dissolved. Bring to boiling point and boil to 240 degrees F. or until candy forms a ball in cold water. Stir occasionally to prevent burning. Remove from fire. Pour onto buttered plate when cool, add salt and vanilla. Work with spatula until creamy. When firm knead in the nut meats. When cold cut in squares. All white sugar may be used.

Variations Brown Sugar Fudge KATHERINE BALL, Riddle. 2 cups brown sugar and 1 cup white, 1/2 t. soda Chocolate Fudge MRS. D. N. BUSENBARK, Roseburg, Ore. MRS. HOWARD CASEBEER, Roseburg, Ore. 1 cup brown sugar and 1 cup white, 1/2 cup cream and 1/4 cup butter. Add 1/4 cup Karo and 2 squares chocolate. When mixture has boiled 2 1/2 min. then proceed as above.

CHEESE BISCUIT HELEN HEARD, Umpqua. MRS. R. E. ROWLEY, Wilbur. 2 cups sifted flour 4 level teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons shortening Milk 3/4 cup grated cheese Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening, then add cheese. Add milk, enough to make soft dough. Toss on floured board, pat out to 3/4 in in thickness. Cut with biscuit cutter and bake in hot oven at 475° F.

HEIDELBERG CABBAGE MRS. A. M. HANKENSON Sutherlin, Ore. 1 red cabbage, chopped and partially cooked. Add 2 or 3 art apples with a little salt. When partly done add a little sugar and vinegar.

FRIED CARROTS MISS MILDRED COATS, Wilbur. MRS. ANNA DEARDORFF, Roseburg, Ore. Wash carrots and scrape. Cut lengthwise into 1/4-in. slices. Boil in salt water until tender. Drain off water and pepper carrots to taste. Roll each slice in flour. Fry in deep fat or saute until well browned. For variations fry carrots with green peppers.

HONEY POPCORN BALLS MRS. E. V. HOOVER, Roseburg. 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup honey 1/2 cup water 1 teaspoon salt 3 quarts popped corn Cook sugar, salt and water to a very brittle stage. Add honey, slowly stirring until blended. Cook again until the thermometer registers 240° about 1 minute. Pour over popped corn. Form into balls.

BANDON SITUATION O. K., DOWN STATES

Captain Lee Bown, commanding officer of state police for the southern Oregon district, spent last night in Roseburg on his way back to district headquarters at Medford. Captain Bown was called to Bandon Sunday, Sept. 27, after the disastrous fire leveled that city, and has been on duty continuously, directing relief and police guard activities. The situation is now well in hand, Captain Bown reports. A detail of state police will remain in Bandon to assist the local authorities during the reconstruction period. Leaving Roseburg this afternoon, Captain Bown took with him Darwin Miller for delivery to the sheriff at Grants Pass. Miller was recently arrested here on a non-support charge at the request of Josephine county authorities.

U. S. SUEDED OVER NRA CONTRACT KILLING

SEATTLE, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Stimson Mill Co., of Seattle, challenged the U. S. government's right today to cancel contracts under the national recovery act. The suit started yesterday in federal district court with the company asking \$8,000 damages for its loss of two 1934 lumber purchasing agreements with the navy department. The government canceled the contracts on charges the company did not comply with the now-unconstitutional NRA. The government contended the price to the navy was below the end price.

VENUE CHANGE TO BE ASKED FOR BRITES

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—An effort to obtain a change of venue for John and Coke Brito, accused of shooting to death two peace officers and a civilian in Siskiyou county, will be made in advance of their arraignment. Defense Attorney Horace F. Frye said today. This will be done, he said, in hopes it will not be necessary to take the poison prisoners back into the community where the killings took place and where threats of mob action were heard a few weeks ago.

L. A. SET TO GREET BOULDER DAM 'JUICE'

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Batteries of searchlights, throwing light of 7,000,000,000 candle power into the sky, will herald the arrival of Los Angeles' first electricity from Boulder dam tomorrow night. Speakers in a nation-wide radio broadcast will announce the city has ample power, after which Miss Elizabeth Scattergood will press a key, setting in motion the generators 266 miles away.

DANCE POSTPONED TO HELP HI-JINX

Cooperating with the senior high school, which is staging the annual Hi-Jinx at the high school auditorium Friday night, Guy Erwin announces that the old-time dance scheduled for that night at MacCabe hall has been cancelled. The dance series will be resumed, however, Oct. 16. An old-time dance will be provided Saturday night, October 10, at the Myrtle Creek grange hall, featuring music of the Oregon Woodchoppers.

FLOOD DEALS RUIN IN BRAZIL REGION

PORTO ALEGRE, Brazil, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The worst flood in years today submerged and isolated vast areas of the state of Rio Grande do Sul, government authorities reported. Ruinous devastation for 50,000 persons, they said, was left by floods which swept across the low, fertile coastal regions to the sea. There were three known deaths. Four thousand were refugees.

MOUSE WINS FIGHT WITH RATTLESNAKE

WALSENBURG, Colo., Oct. 8.—(AP)—The agility of a mouse brought it victory in a fight to the death with a rattlesnake, Mrs. L. A. Busch, ranch woman, related here. The mouse, she said, was fed to the rattlesnake, caged in a huge barrel at the Busch ranch. It dodged the reptile's lunges, Mrs. Busch said, until the snake was worn down, then nibbled off the snake's rattles and killed it.

\$325,000 FIRE HITS VILLAGE IN QUEBEC

ST. ANNE DE BEAUPRE, Que., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Fire destroyed 10 buildings today in this village, home of the famous Catholic shrine, causing damage estimated at \$325,000.
