MAIDS OF HONOR

Canyonville, Ore.

1/2 c Crisco or butter; 2 eggs, un-broken; 1/4 c sugar; 1 1/2 c raspberry jam; 2 c pastry flour; 1/4 t salt; 2 t baking powder; 1/2 c blanched almonds, chopped fine; 1/2 t whipping cream. Beat Crisco and eggs to a cream. Add sugar. Beat until light and soft. Stir in flour, salt and baking powder, sifted together. Form small round balls between hands and put into well greased small muffin tins. Make deep hole in center by pressing the dough up around the edges. Fill with jam and nuts mixed together. Bake in quick oven (450°) whipped cream, sweetened with honey.
