SAWYER ATTACKS DEMO STATEMENTS

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Federal figures show that 51 cents out of every tax dollar collected by the government comes from hidden taxes which hit heaviest among the people who earn \$35 and less a week. Judge Robert W. Sawyer, Bend editor, said in a radio address here. The address opened the republican state committee's radio campaign. Judge Sawyer claimed that the democratic committee makes a spolieman's appeal to Oregonians when the voter's pamphlet asks their support by saying "the people of Oregon appreciate the beneficent Roosevelt administration. They appreciate its generosity. They realize that \$250,000,000 has been or is being spent by the federal agency in this state."

What Roosevelt did with the 1932 democratic platform and his 1932 campaign promises is now being explained to the nation by Al Smith, the Bend judge said.
