MEAT DUMPLING SOUP (German Style) MRS. A. A. MAINE, Roseburg. 1 medium soup bone 1 cup celery 1 cup carrots 1/2 cup parsley 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup onion 1 tomato 1 tablespoon barley Clean and slice vegetables, add with other ingredients to 4 quarts

MINCEMEAT (2 Pies) MRS. W. H. CORDON Roseburg, Ore. Mix 1 chopped apple; 1/2 c raisins; 1/2 c currants; 1/4 c butter; 1 T molasses; 1 T boiled cider; 1 c sugar; 1 t cinnamon; 1/2 t cloves; 1/2 grated nutmeg; 1/2 t mace and 1 t salt. Add enough stock in which meat was boiled to moisten. Heat gradually to boiling point and then simmer 1 hr. Add 1 c chopped meat and 2 T barberry jelly. Variation: Omit eggs. Add 1 c chopped apples; 1/2 t salt; only 1/2 t cinnamon. Mix all together and bake with 2 crusts. Place in rather hot oven, reduce heat. Bake 1 hr.—Mrs. C. W. Wharton, Roseburg.
