TACOMA FIRM BIDS LOW ON SALEM JOB

SALEM, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The American Concrete & Steel Pipe company of Tacoma bid low on the 16.34 miles pipe line for Salem's new water system out of eight firms which entered estimates. Its bid was \$649,272, with the work to be completed within 209 days.

The Tacoma company indicated that if it were awarded the bid by the city council where the winner is announced next week, a temporary concrete pipe plant would be constructed between Salem and Stayton, the source of the city's new water supply. The water line would be built of concrete and steel pipe.

CITY PATROLMAN IS SUSPENDED

EUGENE, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Roy Russell, city patrolman, was suspended here late yesterday, bringing the first case before the newly organized civic service commission.
