RAIN RELIEVES FIRE SITUATION

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Scattered rains brought a measure of relief to fire-threatened forests of Oregon today but proved insufficient to eliminate the hazard.

On the southwestern Oregon coast at Marshfield, 94 of an inch fell, twice that of the last shower on Oct. 3, while at Portland the weather bureau measured .03 and Eugene recorded .01.

Skies cleared off this morning and the weather bureau said fair weather conditions would prevail tonight and Thursday, with morning fogs in some localities and cooler weather in the interior, southern and eastern portions of the state. Warmer weather was predicted in the western sections.

A local forecast at Marshfield indicated the possibility of more rain tomorrow in the area where it is needed most—the southwest coast region.

The humidity rose in the Bend region but the fire danger was reported lessened considerably by cooler weather. Around Klamath Falls, the weather was cool and skies were slightly overcast. A low temperature of 39 degrees was recorded. Cooler and partially cloudy weather prevailed in the Rogue river valley and it was cloudy with cooler temperatures predicted in the Baker territory.

Lack of rain in eastern Oregon forced emergency forest lookouts back to their posts, with the fire hazard reported acute. A small fire occurred on Patit creek but was controlled.

OREGON STATE CO-ED IS FOUR MONTHS OLD

CORVALLIS, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Sue "Kent," who gets her last name because she is the new "mistress" of Kent Home Management house at Oregon State college, is the latest addition to the campus population. Sue has become one of the most popular co-eds on the campus already—yet she is only 4½ months old.

Brought from the Waverly baby home in Portland to give the home economics seniors practical experience in child care and training, Sue is now under the alternate care of a half-dozen picked co-eds who serve as "mothers" a week at a time each, all under the general supervision of a staff member living in the house with the girls.

Heavy penalties, involving both fines and imprisonment for Filipinos and Americans who use their citizenship rights in the islands to help aliens acquire lands, franchises or other national concessions, are provided in a bill considered by the national assembly. The bill would fix penalties of from 10 to 20 years imprisonment and fines of from \$5,000 to \$10,000. The aliens also are subject to the penalties.

COAST STRIKE WAITS COMMISSION ACTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Pacific coast waterfront unions and employers today looked to extended truce negotiations and action by the United States maritime commission for settlement of their disputes.

The unions qualified their consent to extension of the truce from Oct. 15 to 26 by asking the commission to give assurance of results.

They "insisted" wage provisions that may be reached be retroactive to October 1.

The employers, accepting an indefinite continuation of present working agreements, advised the federal commission they understood it was "assuming responsibility" for future waterfront peace. Action by both sides, in response to a call from the commission for continued operation, lifted the threat of a shipping tie-up Thursday night.

The Thursday deadline was set October 1 when both sides agreed to a 15-day extension of expiring agreements.

Brothers Claimed Room
Reports to officers said that Puett brothers had claimed the room after Taylor had paid for it and that in an earlier dispute last night in a pool hall, Taylor had produced a revolver but Harvey took it away from him.

Harvey was 48 years old and his brother was 60. Ban once had been a well-to-do stockman but in recent years had suffered financial reverses, friends said. Taylor had been herding sheep.

Besides Harvey and Ban, two other of the six Puett brothers have been slain in gun battles. Herb was killed some years ago in a fight at Mitchell, Ore., in which his opponent also was slain and Jim died in a gunfight at Prairie City.

said an inquest failed to reveal a motive for the shooting. A coroner's jury devoted its attention to the death of Harvey and found it was caused from a gunshot wound inflicted by an automatic pistol held by Taylor. An inquest into Ban's death will follow late today.

Witnesses said Taylor, employed by a stock company as "Jones," started firing without provocation after the brothers, Taylor and James Leonard, had gone to the rooming house, presumably to get some liquor.

Finding the room locked, Harvey said he had a pass key.

"There is no need for a key," Taylor was quoted as saying. Witnesses said he drew a revolver and

started firing.
As Ban and Harvey fell, Taylor jumped to the ground, witnesses related, and ordered Leonard off the porch. Putnam, the night officer, hearing the shots, reached the rooming house just as Leonard started to obey.

When Taylor saw the officer approaching, he handed his empty pistol to Leonard but instead of accepting it, Leonard felled Taylor with a blow, the testimony related.

Witnesses said the men had been drinking but were not unduly intoxicated.
