OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

RAINIER, Ore., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Death of Victor Zimmerdahl, 31, of Rainier at a Longview, Wash., hospital brought the list of dead to three as a result of a train-truck collision yesterday at Held's crossing.

The other victims were Arne Brummla, 32, and Wallace Terway, 25, both of Astoria.

The truck in which the three men were riding was struck by an eastbound passenger train. Their clothes, drenched with gasoline from the battered fuel tank, ignited.

Brummla and Terway were dead when picked up.

MEFORD, Ore., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Total registration for a wagon county was given as 20,692 when the county clerk checked the final figures.

The clerk estimated 85 per cent of the 2048 increase was democratic. The count by parties has not been completed.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Senator Charles McNary received the endorsement of the Portland central labor council. McNary, republican, is a candidate for reelection.

Rufus C. Holman, who seeks another term as state treasurer, also received the organization's support.

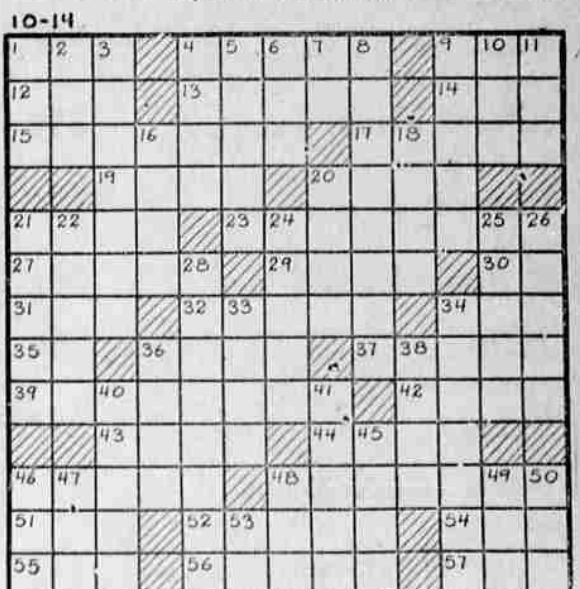
A furniture store manager said shipping concerns had refused to accept furniture consignments to west coast ports.
