TRANSIENT HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Juddie Savage, 18, a transient, was held by Siskiyou county, Cal., officers today in the slaying of an unidentified man at Tule Lake.

Savage admitted under questioning that he had stabbed the other man after the two had become involved in a dispute at a pool hall and gone out behind the building to settle the matter.

Savage said he used his knife when his opponent struck at him with a flashlight.

The wounded man died in an ambulance en route to Klamath Falls. A post-mortem showed that his heart had been punctured and three ribs severed by the knife blow. His body was being held at the morgue here pending identification. He appeared to have been about 10 years old.

Savage was taken to the county jail at Yreka.

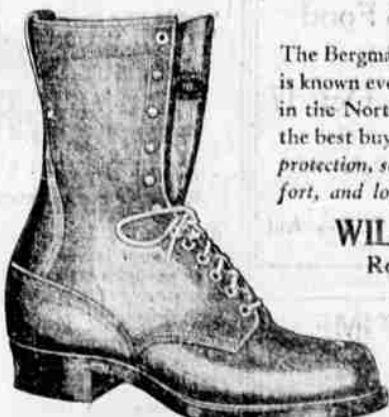
