BAKING POWDER CINNAMON ROLLS

MRS. FRED ELLIOTT
Canyonville, Ore.
Make biscuit dough and roll medium thin. Spread liberally with butter, sugar, cinnamon (other spice may be used with cinnamon). Roll the dough in firm roll, slice and bake in medium hot oven. May be iced with powdered sugar icing. These rolls are a great favorite in our family.

Cream 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup butter, add 2 well beaten eggs, beat in this 1 cup molasses, 1 teaspoon each of ginger, cinnamon and cloves. Dissolve 2 level teaspoons of soda in a very little cold water to the soda add 1 cup boiling water.

2 1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt (the batter will seem thin but don't add any more flour). Beat well, put in well buttered pan and bake in slow oven 45 min. Can serve with whipped cream. Makes a very good dessert.

Serve with soft cheese, vanilla ice cream or with whipped cream. For variety in baking, cover bottom of baking pan with sliced tart apples, or marshmallows may be split and dropped on top of the batter just before it is placed in the oven. Again the gingerbread may be baked in two pans and the layers put together with strawberry jam or orange marmalade.—Mrs. J. A. Young.

MAPLE NUT FUDGE

MRS. HARRY BURR, Roseburg.
1 cup white sugar
2 cups brown sugar
2 teaspoons vinegar
1/2 cup maple syrup
1/2 cup water
1 tablespoon butter
Pinch salt
Mix all ingredients well, in a pan that may be tightly covered. Cover, and bring slowly to a boil. Cook, still covered, until the soft ball stage, remove from fire, cool in pan, keeping covered, until lukewarm. Add 1 cup chopped nuts and beat until thick and creamy. Pour in pan and mark in squares.

Variations

Creamy Fudge Squares
MRS. HARRY BURR, Roseburg.
Omit vinegar, maple syrup and water for which substitute 1/2 cup evaporated milk and 2 tbs. light corn syrup. Add 2 squares unsweetened chocolate.

DATE PIE

MRS. JACK CULVER, Sutherlin.
4 T butter, melted. Mix 4 T flour with butter, 2 c milk added to this, put on stove and thicken. Add 1/2 t salt and 1 pkz. dates and 1/2 c sugar. Cook all together for a long time, slowly to prevent burning, until quite dark. Then add 2 beaten egg yolks and fold in the 2 whites, beaten stiff. Put in a pie tin lined with uncooked pastry and bake in a slow oven. Serve with whipped cream.

CAULIFLOWER GOLDEN

MRS. C. E. MOYER, Roseburg.
Cook separately a medium size cauliflower and 1 c rice. Place the cauliflower unbroken in buttered baking dish. Beneath, around, and over the top arrange alternate layers of rice and very thin slices of grated American cheese. Season slightly with milk or a bit of the cauliflower water, and place in oven just long enough to melt the cheese.

PRESIDENT MET BY RECORD CROWD

Mammoth Reception Is Given Roosevelt in Speech at Chicago.

ABOARD ROOSEVELT TRAIN EN ROUTE TO DETROIT, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Warmth by the mammoth demonstration accorded him in the nation's second largest city, President Roosevelt headed into Michigan today to drive home his assertion at Chicago that the new deal was aligned against "anarchy" of the "power of concentrated wealth" and not against private enterprise.

Behind a corps of 30 motorcycle patrolmen he rode last night along streets lined by a cheering multitude, numbered in tens of thousands, to face 25,000 persons in the packed Chicago stadium, where he set forth the emphatic declaration:

"All that this administration has done, all that it proposes to do—and this it does propose to do—is to use every power and authority of the federal government to protect the commerce of America from the selfish forces which ruined it."

To the credit of the new deal, he claimed, "the train of American business is moving ahead. Mind you, it did not get out of the ditch itself, it was hauled out by your government."

The president's return as a seeker of reelection to the city—and stadium—where he was nominated in 1932 was marked by a mass turnout which taxed the efforts of 1,600 policemen.

To clear his automobile route from special train to stadium the motorcycle escort parted a marching throng estimated at 100,000 to 150,000 by the police and Co-Chairman Barnet Hodes of the reception committee.
