COAST RAILROAD PLAN IS STUDIED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The record of the testimony on the application of Grants Pass, Ore., for permission to build and operate a railroad between Grants Pass and Crescent City, Calif., was assigned to an examiner for study by the interstate commerce commission.

On the examiner's report, expected in about two weeks, the commission will base its final action.

Explaining the usual ICC procedure in such cases, officials said that should the examiner decide the evidence does not warrant issuance of a certificate of "public convenience and necessity," he would issue a "proposed report" to which the city and others interested would be given opportunity to reply.

On the other hand, if he found the evidence sustains the application, he would file a "final report" with the commission recommending approval.

The city's application asks permission to acquire the holdover of the California and Oregon Coast railroad and to extend its 14.6 miles of track to an ocean terminus at Crescent City, 83 miles distant. Cost of the project, which would be financed through the works progress administration and the Reconstruction Finance corporation, was estimated by the city as \$7,380,828.

POOR HUNTING DUE TO DRY WEATHER

Poor hunting and fishing conditions prevail in the Umpqua National forest due to prevailing dry weather, according to the weekly recreation bulletin from local forest service headquarters. The bulletin issued today contains the following information:

Hunting: Due to the extreme dry period which has prevailed over the entire western Oregon country for the past several weeks, deer hunting has been very poor on the Umpqua, along with other sections. Very few hunters have reported success, and those who have had to work very hard for their kill. As a matter of fact, very few hunters are now going into the mountains, because it is well known that chances for success are very slim. When a rain comes hunting should be good, since apparently deer are reasonably plentiful, and as hunters all know should come out from brush thickets on to ridge tops and in open timber when storms start.

Fishing: Except for some catches of steelheads that are being made between Rock creek and Circle H lodge on files principally, the streams of the forest seem to be yielding very few fish. All of the small streams are very low at this time and very few fishermen are even attempting to make catches. Salmon trout are seemingly the only species that give the sportsmen anything to talk about right now, and these are found principally in the lower section of Umpqua and generally, so far as known, are being taken on salmon eggs.

Fire hazards: As has been advertised in the various newspapers of this state and in radio announcements, the governor has extended the fire season for an indefinite time because of the very unusual hazard that now exists. Summarizing, this means that the following forest rules, both within and without the forests of the state, still prevail: 1. No smoking

while traveling. 2. Camp fire permits are still required for all camps except the few which are highly improved and are attended by caretakers. 3. All camping parties, regardless whether by auto or pack train or otherwise, should carry shovel, axe and water bucket with them.

The Umpqua forest very greatly appreciates the splendid cooperation which has generally been shown the present season. There have been quite a number of fires started from human causes, such as abandoned camp fires, careless smokers, some of whom were evidently smoking while traveling, and a few fires have been maliciously set, but on the whole the cooperation of the citizens of this national forest territory has been excellent and the local office of the forest service, and likewise the regional forester, very much appreciate this cooperation.

Returns to McMinnville—Paul Warren, local high school teacher and athletic coach, left yesterday for McMinnville, where he was called by the death of his uncle, A. C. Snyder, chief engineer of the municipal plant in that city. Mr. and Mrs. Warren and son, Billy, went to McMinnville the first of the week and the former had returned here Tuesday to resume his teaching, when he received word of Mr. Snyder's death. They will remain in McMinnville until after the funeral, when they will return to Roseburg.
