Cut 1/2 lb. salt pork into small pieces and fry to a light brown, add 1 large onion cut up real fine and cook 10 min. (Boil 2 med. potatoes with skins on, skin and dice into first part; add 1 large can clams and cook 15 min., add 2 qt. milk and bring to boiling point. Season with salt and pepper. Serve hot.

JOBLESS INSURANCE FUND PAST MILLION

SALEM, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Oregon employers' contribution to the unemployment compensation fund passed the million dollar mark this year, T. Morris Dunne, chairman of the commission, announced prior to his departure for Jackson, Wis., to attend a national conference on social security legislation. Employers of four or more persons this year are paying nine-tenths of one per cent of payroll to the fund which will become operative in 1938.

DISEASE TAKING HEAVY HORSE TOLL

An equine disease called encephalomyelitis, almost unknown until the past five or six years, has killed approximately 30,000 American horses since 1930, Dr. W. H. Hendrix, chief veterinarian of Utah, one of the most heavily affected states, describes the disease as a major American farm problem.

"Since the arrival of the automobile," Dr. Hendrix says, "our horse population has at best been inadequate. If encephalomyelitis continues the horde of the last six years, the horse shortage will become serious."

So little is known of the disease, sometimes inadequately called brain fever or sleeping sickness, that efforts to fight it are largely futile. "We know definitely the disease can be and is spread by mosquitoes. We also suspect horse flies and other insects of being the carriers," declares Hendrix. "First appearing in California in 1931, the disease spread rapidly and in 1933 killed about 10,000 horses in Utah alone, together with hundreds of others in the east and midwest."

Comparatively rare last year, it occurred in epidemic form in the west this spring and has killed several thousand farm horses in Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Colorado.

IRRIGATION LAGS BEHIND EROSION

GRAND COULEE, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Frank A. Barnes, U. S. reclamation bureau chief engineer for the Grand Coulee project, told the Washington irrigation institute here that nature is destroying soil faster than man can prepare it for crops.

"Soil erosion is taking out of production in this country each year more land than has been irrigated by the federal government since the passage of the reclamation act 34 years ago," he declared in a speech prepared for delivery at the opening session of the 24th meeting of the institute.

BETTE DAVIS FACES BRITISH FILM BAN

LONDON, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Bette Davis, American film player, was restrained today from appearing in motion pictures or other performances in England for any company except Warner Brothers of Hollywood.

The injunction was granted by Justice Branson upon application of the American film company. The injunction specified the ban could be operative for the remainder of her contract with Warner Brothers or for three years, whichever period is shorter.

Miss Davis was described by her counsel, Sir William Jowitt, as an actress under a "life sentence." Sir Patrick Hastings, representing the American film company, declared Miss Davis was "a naughty little girl who wants more money."
