MRS. KLETZER WILL DISCUSS TAX BILL

Mrs. William Kletzer, member of the executive committee of the Oregon advisory council on public schools, will appear in Roseburg October 23, to talk on behalf of the "tax limitation constitutional amendment for school districts having 100,000 population." Although this bill affects only the taxes of school district No. 1, which comprises the city of Portland, the entire state has to vote on it as a proposed constitutional amendment.

The measure, which aims to straighten out the financial tangle of the Portland public schools, has received wide support and been endorsed by many newspapers and organizations. Among the newspapers that have endorsed it are the Oregonian, and among the organizations that have endorsed it are the American Legion auxiliary, Oregon State Federation of Labor, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Spanish-American War Veterans, Oregon Fraternity Congress, Oregon State Grange, and the state department of the American Legion, and Oregon Congress of Parent-Teachers. While in this city Mrs. Kletzer will confer with officers of the Parent-Teachers association and the American Legion auxiliary. Mrs. Kletzer is an active member of both groups.
