RHYTHM ON RANGE

By all odds the most tuneful, most amusing and most unique of the films to feature Bing Crosby, new rollicking musical, "Rhythm on the Range," which opened yesterday at the Indian theatre, provides a balanced program of song, comedy and romance unmatched by any recent screen offerings.

Introducing Bob Burns, drawing Arkansas maestro of the gas-pipe bazooka, for his first important movie role, "Rhythm on the Range" casts Frances Farmer opposite Crosby and surrounds the trio with a score of the best talent in films.

A brief outline of the story serves to indicate the general comedy spirit of the fast-moving musical romance.

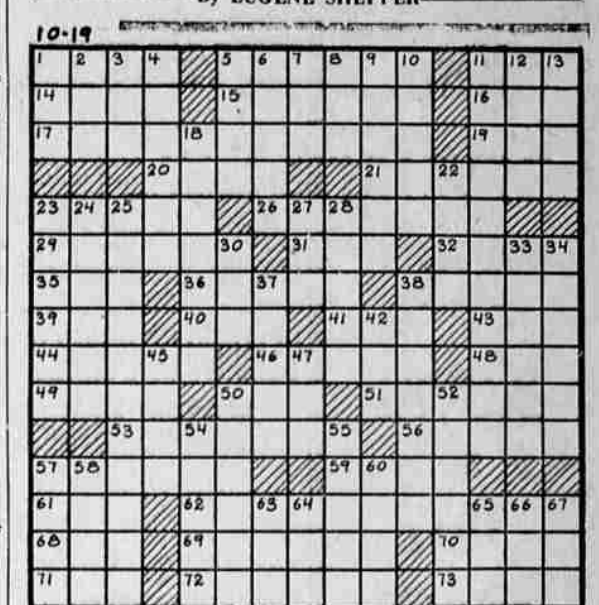
