

BEND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH SEES SPLIT

BEND, Ore., Oct. 19.—(AP)—A friendly difference of theological opinion led to a split in the First Presbyterian church of Bend today and brought an announcement from a seceding group that it will petition for affiliation with the newly formed Presbyterian church of America.

Glenn Cole, until Sunday pastor of the Presbyterian church here, made known his resignation from the parent church Saturday, and yesterday preached to both local factions what he termed his "farewell sermon."

After his address, the group supporting Cole met in the Baptist church to organize. It was indicated today they would ask affiliation with the new national body at a Presbytery in Corvallis this week.

It was voted to form a new unit here, to be called the Westminster Presbyterian church. Leaders of the split said more than half the members of the First Presbyterian church seceded. The new local organization as yet has no building.

The national organization from which the Bend group voted withdrawal is known as the Presbyterian church of the United States of America—identical in name to the new national group with the exception of the words "the United States."

Cole said he would petition to be received as pastor in the new national organization.

The pastor's announcement and the subsequent withdrawal from the church of part of the congregation resulted, Cole said, from action taken recently at the general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States of America at Syracuse, N. Y.

The pastor said he opposed putting "the fallible word man above the infallible word God" and that "there is widespread modernism and unbelief. Support of modernism is contrary to the Bible. Therefore, as a true minister of the gospel I must obey God rather than man."

Cole came here from North Bend.

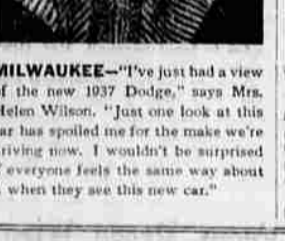
FOUR-H CLUB ACTIVITIES

AGENTS GET EYEFUL OF '37 BUICK LINE

FLINT, Mich., Oct. 20.—A high mark of enthusiasm over the 1937 line of Buick automobiles was set here this week as approximately 6,000 members of the Buick field organization, General Motors executives, dealers and salesmen from every part of the world previewed the new car and listened to addresses by Buick officials.

The car itself was unveiled before each successive group of dealers and salesmen on the stage of the E. M. A. auditorium from under a huge bag bearing the legend "It's in the bag."

William F. Hufstader, vice president and general sales manager, presided and cited the great gains made by Buick during 1935, closing with a request for an increase of at least thirty per cent in total sales for the new year. 1935 production reached a total of 173,411.

While he paid high tribute to the organization that took the 1936 quota of 136,000 cars in its stride and then zoomed the sales totals to a lanky 173,411, he pointed out that to coast on that fine record would be fatal.

"That job is done now, and done as it should be. From now on, the comeback year of 1936 is of value to us only in the momentum it has given us and of value only as we utilize the experience it gave," he said.

"Only as you heed those lessons, only as you apply them in your daily work, only as you make them produce for you in 1937 and the years ahead, is the good year 1936 worth remembering. Our success is not something to coast on, but to utilize."

"Once more Buick is putting the job on you in your hands," he concluded. "Once more Buick is giving you the tools to do it—the best tools we know how to give. I am sure you know what the job is, and what it will take in energy and attention and devotion to do it, and that you will not skimp on any of these. SHIP HELD UNSAFE, CREW WON'T SAIL

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Only the captain, the chief officer and the chief engineer were officially aboard the idle steamer Oregon in the Portland harbor today.

Other members of the crew were paid off yesterday and the grain-laden vessel, tied up by a dispute over its seaworthiness and sanitary conditions, apparently had no immediate prospects of getting under way for Atlantic ports.

The boat failed to sail as scheduled last Thursday when six members of the crew refused to sign. They asked several physical changes in the craft, claiming they were needed to make the ship sanitary and seaworthy.

Seamen were given the privilege of remaining aboard until a crew list furnished. Owners said no effort would be made to get the Oregon to sea until the union supplies a crew.

Mrs. Azalea Sager, state home demonstration leader, from Corvallis, will be here to conduct this meeting, which will begin at 10:30 in the morning and last until 3 p. m. Training and duties will be given for presidents, vice presidents, secretaries and treasurers of organizations.

CHILD DROWNS IN 12 INCHES OF WATER

PENDLETON, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Raymond Rice, three-year old son of Mrs. Louis Garland, of McKay creek, was drowned in McKay creek late Friday afternoon as he played near the home of his grandparents, two and one-half miles south of Pendleton. His small body was found by his mother in twelve inches of water near the bank of the stream not far from the house.

CCC ACHIEVEMENTS IN OREGON LISTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Robert Fechner, chief of the civilian conservation corps, summed up the CCC's career since April, 1933, with a report today showing 23,249 Oregon men were given employment during the period and obligations totaling \$22,934,000 had been incurred.

The survey said 52 camps were operating in the state as of October 1. These included national forests, 20; state forests, two; private forests, seven; biological surveys, two; soil conservation, six; reclamation bureau, five; grading division, three; national monuments and state parks, seven.

Fechner said that between April, 1933, and August 31, 1935, the 23,249 enrollees had allotted \$7,982,000 out of their \$30 monthly cash allowance to dependents.

He listed accomplishments of the CCC in completed projects to July 1 as:

Truck trails, 3,200 miles; telephone lines, 3,155 miles; lookout towers and houses, 212; road control, 1,006,951 acres; forest stands improved, 3,395 acres; fighting forest fires, 190,558 man-days; insect pest control, 762,605 acres; large and impounding diversion dams, 83.

ORMOND B. OWEN ENLISTS IN NAVY

Ormond B. Owen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cole W. Owen of Roseburg, has enlisted in the U. S. army, through the Portland recruiting office, and has been assigned to foreign service. He expressed preference for service in the Hawaiian Islands and has been assigned to the field artillery. He will sail November 13 on an army transport and will arrive in Honolulu a week later, according to present plans.

DEATH ENDS FIGHT FOR CHICAGO ZONE

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—(AP)—"Ma" Streeter's 20-year fight for the rights to Gold Coast property along Chicago's Lake Michigan shore valued at \$250,000,000 was ended yesterday by death.

Known familiarly to Chicagoans of a generation ago as the "Empress of Streeterville," 63-year-old Elma Lockwood Streeter died peacefully and alone but to the end grimly belligerent.

She joined Capt. George Wellington Streeter in the battle on their return from a honeymoon moon. He began the fight in 1889, claiming squatter's rights to 189 acres of land immediately north of the loop created by natural sand deposits and the contents of dump wagons.

Over her protests she was removed from her little cottage, where she lived in seclusion, to the county hospital.

Neighbors said the aged woman sold aprons from door to door to eke out a precarious living; and that to the end she retained with in easy reach inside her door the shotgun she frequently brought in to play to defend her claims.

Before Capt. Streeter died in 1921 at the age of 84, he saw some of Chicago's most fashionable

ITALIANS DEFEAT ETHIOPIAN ARMY

By the Associated Press. ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia, Oct. 20.—A fierce battle, involving an artillery duel between the Italian division of General Geloso and an Ethiopian regiment under Dofjaz Abal, was disclosed today in dispatches reaching Addis Ababa.

The Italian division was marching southwest of Addis Ababa toward Lake Margherita when it met the Ethiopians at Mount Ghatasere, a natural fortress more than 3,000 feet high.

Geloso, whose column was moving in 1,000 trucks, first shelled the Ethiopian position for several hours, reducing the cannon and most of the machine guns to silence.

Then Italian bombers flew over and bombarded the Ethiopian line and Geloso ordered an advance.

The Italians scaled the mountain under cover of their own artillery fire. Reaching the top, they charged with bayonets and hand grenades, routing the Ethiopians.

Later, flank attacks by Ethiopians were repulsed.

The battle lasted for five hours and the Ethiopians left between 200 and 400 dead, among them their commander.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Nels Eddy, 53, farmer residing 20 miles northeast of Vancouver, drowned in his 40-foot well Sunday. Coroner E. H. Rider said relatives saw Eddy fall into the pit but were unable to rescue him. The widow and three sons survive.
