CLAM CHOWDER

MRS. PAUL DUSSEAU

2 cans minced clams or 1 pt.
2 quarts whole milk
1 can condensed milk
2 large potatoes
2 medium size onions
3 or 4 slices bacon
2 tablespoons butter, salt and pepper

Cut potatoes fine, cook in little water until tender, add clams, milk and butter. Cut small pieces and fry in little fat until brown. Add this to your milk, and let come to boiling point and serve. This will serve 6 people with 2 helpings. Better when warmed up, so don't throw the left over chowder out.

SQUASH PIE

Lookingglass, Ore.

Filling for 2 pies: 1 1/2 c squash;
1 1/2 c sugar; 2 c milk; 4 eggs beaten;
1/2 t nutmeg; 1/2 t ginger; 1/2 t salt;
1 t cinnamon; 1 t allspice.

Combine squash, sugar and spices, add milk and mix thoroughly. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake 10 min. at 475° to set crust and then lower temperature to 350°. Bake until set or when a silver knife inserted in center will come out clean. Cool. Serve piled high with sweetened whipped cream.

PLAN SHADY POINT
ROAD BEAUTIFYING

A program of highway beautification along the new grade of the Pacific highway between Shady Point and Kelley's Korner, is being considered by the Roseburg chamber of commerce, Umpqua national forest service and state highway department, chamber of commerce directors were informed at the regular meeting last night.

Advocated recently by the chamber of commerce, V. V. Harpham, forest supervisor and chairman of the beautification committee has contacted the highway department relative to the planting of trees along the new right of way. If definite arrangements can be reached, Mr. Harpham reported that the plantings can be handled by trained men.

W. C. Harding, secretary of the chamber of commerce, reported that an invitation extended to Walter W. R. May, manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, to address the annual meeting of the local organization, Thursday, January 7, had been accepted.

He also reported that the chamber's suggestion of \$500 for a county exhibit at the state fair and \$500 for an advertising fund had been included in the tentative county budget.

Plans for sponsorship of a Christmas merchandise showing were discussed.

The directors instructed the secretary to contact the city council and urge that steps be taken to curb speeding across the Oak street bridge.
