OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

SALEM, Oct. 20. (AP)—Work on Oregon's new capitol building will start about December 1 of this year. C. C. Hockley, public works administrator for the state, told the Salem chamber of commerce. Bids from the best contractors available over the nation will be opened at Portland November 20, giving contractors ten days in which to provide bonds and insurance before work can begin. Hockley said.

SALEM, Oct. 20. Fifty-eight tons of paper, or nearly three carloads, will go into the mails this week as the voters' pamphlets are distributed to more than 300,000 registered voters, the secretary of state announced.

The pamphlet, nearly 50 per cent larger this year than ever before in the history of the state, required three and a half million impressions and will cost about \$7,000 to mail out. Arguments for and against the eight measures on the ballot alone required 48 pages.

HILLSBORO, Oct. 20. The big Sherman sawmill northwest of here, idle for three years, was destroyed by fire. The office building and nearby cabins were saved. The mill, once capable of turning out 125,000 board feet a day, formerly was valued at \$100,000. It was being dismantled. Origin of the fire was not determined.

PORTLAND, Oct. 20. Formation of a union for works progress administration employees was announced here by Ralph Sheriff, president. The group will be known

as the American Federation of Government Employees.

Application for a charter has been made to the American Federation of Labor, Sheriff said. The membership includes those engaged in cultural, professional and office occupations on WPA projects.

SALEM, Oct. 20. To assist in enforcing Portland's ordinance requiring inspection of automobiles twice a year, State Secretary Snell was asked to set aside a special block of license numbers for Multnomah county.

Commissioner Riley of Portland said the action would aid police in distinguishing Multnomah cars from those of other sections of the state.

PORTLAND, Oct. 20. State police and game department investigators, in a survey of Williams sloughs where fish destruction had been reported, found three dead fish.

Ed Moore, ferryman at Burlington, told the investigators he found more than a score of dead salmon Saturday. Pete Dimeyer, riverman near Scappoose, also reported victims.

The game department was checking on the possibility of pollution.

SALEM, Oct. 20. The automobile fatality list jumped to five the past week, with 130 persons injured, the secretary of state announced. The number of accidents also showed an increase, with 601 reported.

COAST ROAD JOBS' COMPLETION URGED

TILLAMOOK, Oct. 20. (AP)—The Oregon Coast Highway association stood committed today to the immediate completion of the Wilson River and Wolf Creek short-route projects and the development of naval defenses at the mouth of the Columbia river.

Resolutions incorporating the proposals were passed at the concluding session of the two-day meeting last night. Relocation of the Corvallis-Newport highway between Toledo and Newport, completion of the Nehalem road project and the improvement of designated arteries in the Marshfield and Coquille areas also were favored.

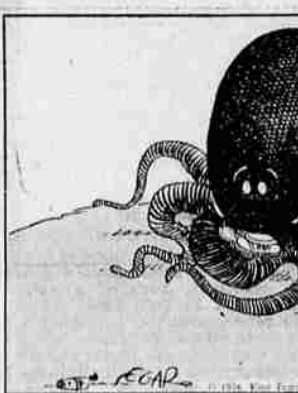
