MADRID'S DEFENDERS STEM REBEL ONSET

BUSINESS BLOCK IN SAN DIEGO RAVAGED BY FLAMES

TOLL OF FIRE ESTIMATED AT \$2,000,000

Whitney's, National Dollar Stores Total Losses; Two Men Hurt, One Likely Fatally.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Oct. 21.—(AP)—A spectacular skyline fire, sweeping through a downtown business block, with damage unofficially estimated at \$2,000,000, was brought under control today. Thousands of persons watched 200 firemen and volunteers win a blow battle against the flames, which broke out shortly after midnight in the Whitney apartment store and leaped to the full length of the 11-story Watts office building in the same block. Two men were critically injured. A fireman, Eddie Baum, suffered a possible skull fracture when the nozzle of a high-pressure hose broke. V. Szezanowski, 21, seaman attached to the destroyer Dale, sustained a head injury that naval hospital attaches said would claim his life, when he fell through the roof of the burning National Dollar store while handling another fire hose. The three-story Whitney store was completely gutted by the flames, only the blackened walls remaining standing. The National Dollar store likewise was a total loss.

Landon Says Liberty Periled Roosevelt Emphasizes Security Browder Flees Egg Barrage

New Deal Threatening to Wreck Bill of Rights, G.O.P. Leader Tells Californians.

ABOARD LONDON SPECIAL EN ROUTE TO PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon turned his presidential campaign eastward across the continent today after an address asserting the new deal threatened to destroy the bill of rights and a statement that the administration was "throwing the ball around wildly attempting to score." "If we are to preserve our American form of government, this administration must be defeated," the republican nominee told a cheering throng estimated at 75,000 in the Los Angeles coliseum last night. In a 40-minute radio speech, the longest in his campaign thus far, Landon said "panned society, which is the alternative to representative government... has destroyed freedom of speech, freedom of the press, freedom of religion." In a formal reply to a speech by Secretary Landon in Washington describing Landon as a "state socialist," the Kansan said new deal spokesmen had pitched their attack upon him as "a puppet of big business" on "the ground that I am a socialist and the enemy of big business." "This is typical of the confusion and contradictory policies that have characterized this administration from its beginning," he added.

Laborites Support Roosevelt, McNary

PORTLAND, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The Portland central labor council threw its support today for the November election behind President Roosevelt and Senator Charles McNary. Announcing a slate of candidates whom it would support, the council also named State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman but declined to designate candidates seeking the congressional seat in the third district or attorney general. The council also decided to withhold comment on the eight state measures on the ballot, saying it did not want to interfere with the legislative program of the state federation of labor. A motion which would have ordered council officers to participate in a Roosevelt-Garner parade here Saturday was voted down, the council saying that such participation should be voluntary.

People Above Machines in Importance, President Avers in His New England Drive.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 21.—(AP)—President Roosevelt told a huge crowd here today that the American people were "more important than machines" and the "material resources of America should serve the human resources of America." In opening his New England campaign, the president also declared the American people should not be allowed again "to be regimented by selfish minorities into bankruptcies and bread lines," and that the 1929 type of prosperity should be avoided. The kind of prosperity sought, he said, was that which would assure every American family safety of home, old age, savings and employment. Mentioning the constitution at the outset of his brief speech, the president said he was standing on the steps of the capitol of a state "so independent that it did not ratify the constitution of the United States until two years after it was in effect." The president spoke from an open car resting on a stone landing. The crowd gave him a noisy welcome as he arrived and was introduced by Governor Theodore F. Green. Governor James M. Curley of Massachusetts, also stood nearby. Efforts Reviewed. The president spoke in part as follows: "I have said that what the present national administration has tried to do was to adjust statecraft to reality—the reality of 18 (Continued on page 6)

McNARY TO BE AIDED IN LAND TAX PROGRAM

Representatives of Grant Counties Will Be Named to Participate in Bill Framing.

A committee to work with Senator Charles L. McNary in preparation of legislation dealing with tax measures pertaining to federal-owned land in Oregon was authorized at a meeting of representatives of 16 Oregon counties here yesterday afternoon. Conferring with judges and commissioners from grant land counties of the state, Senator McNary declared himself definitely for a policy of federal payments to counties in lieu of taxes on lands held by the federal government, and pledged cooperation with the Oregon land grant counties association in efforts to preserve the tax equities of counties. The senator declared that he favored payments by the federal government on lands which may be acquired by purchase, as well as on reversioned railroad grant lands and timber lands withdrawn for national forests. He told the representatives of the counties he would work for legislation to preserve tax rights in order that county tax burdens might not be increased by further withdrawal of lands for federal purposes. Fisk to Appear. The county judges and commissioners present at the meeting voted to appoint a committee to assist in preparing legislation, the actual appointments to be left to County Judge Fred Fisk of Lane county, president of the association. In the absence of Judge Fisk at the meeting today, Judge Earl Day of Jackson county presided over the conference. Senator McNary, who spoke here at noon Tuesday at a public meeting, where he pledged his efforts (Continued on page 6)

CONVERSION OF FACILITY HERE DISPLEASING

Governor Asked to Protest On Behalf of War Vets; Obligation Cited by Senator Fisher.

State Senator Walter S. Fisher of Douglas county announced this morning that he is communicating with Governor Charles H. Martin urging the governor to make immediate protest on behalf of the veterans of the state of Oregon against the ordered conversion of the U. S. veterans administration facility here into an institution for neuropsychiatric cases. The governor will be asked to request the veterans administration to modify its order and provide additional facilities, rather than make a conversion of present units. Senator Fisher's plan is based on the fact that veterans of southern Oregon and northern California, now provided with hospital and domiciliary service by the institution at Roseburg, will be left without needed care or resources in emergencies. Obligation Implied. The fact that the state of Oregon formerly maintained domiciliary and hospital service for its veterans, and deeded the state institution to the federal government as part of the two million dollar facility here, implies an obligation on the part of the federal government to maintain hospital and barracks units at Roseburg, Senator Fisher contends. While N-P facilities in connection with the institution at Roseburg are desirable, Fisher said, they should be added to the present institution, with existing services remaining unchanged. Fisher is preparing, he said, to draw up briefs, setting forth data, relative to the need for continuation of hospital and domiciliary care at the veterans facility here, for the use of Senator Charles L. McNary and Frederick Steiwer, who will be asked to join in the (Continued on page 6)

Nail Removed From Glendale Youth's Lung

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Surgeons removed a two-inch nail today from the lung of three-year-old Benjamin Mouchette, Jr., of Glendale, Oregon. The boy inhaled the nail October 1. The Temple university hospital issued a statement that his condition was good. The operation was performed by use of a bronchoscope and bi-plane fluoroscope. The boy arrived Sunday night with his parents after a 3,700-mile airplane trip, and was taken to the bronchoscopic clinic of Dr. Chevalier Jackson, inventor of the perfected bronchoscope. Surgeons attending the convention of the American College of Surgeons witnessed the operation.

WHITE COLLAR FORCES PROVE VALOR IN WAR

Deadly Counter Attacks on Foe Reported; Fascist Bombing Planes Do Bloody Work.

MADRID, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Entrenched socialist troops, fighting savagely to stem a fascist drive on Madrid, held dogged insurgents at bay today 20 miles from the Spanish capital. The desperate defenders, reinforced by civilian recruits, rushed from Madrid, held their positions during an insurgent bombardment and countered with deadly attacks of their own. "So far we have succeeded in halting the rebel advance on Madrid," exulted Gen. Jose Asensio, socialist commander. The fresh "white collar" forces—store clerks and mechanics, young and old—lunged into the running conflict with the shrill "to arms" exhortations of Madrid womenfolk still ringing in their ears. The government line, ranging southeast from Ilescas to the Madrid-Aranjuez highway near Sesena, withstood a falling insurgent bombardment and countered with deadly attacks on fascist positions at four other points on the Tagus river. Gen. Asensio predicted the fall of Ilescas, captured by insurgents Sunday, was "imminent." Bombers Deal Death. Squadrons of fascist bombing planes dived over the battle area, raining death amid the serried ranks of socialist attackers and wrecking the railroad station at Castillejos, 10 miles west of Aranjuez. On the northern front, four fascist columns consolidated their mountain positions ready to swoop down on historic El Escorial, 24 miles from Madrid. Fascist planes bombed and machine-gunned the entrenched defenders of the famous resort city three times. From the insurgents' high posts, Madrid was plainly visible in daylight. Near Robledo de Chavela, a socialist-armed train was trapped in a mountain tunnel, cut off by dynamite-blasted rails at both ends (Continued on page 6)

TRAIN-AUTO CRASH FATAL TO WOMAN

Mrs. Snell of Leland Dies of Injuries; Operation Fails to Save Baby.

Mrs. Hazel Snell, 19, an expectant mother, died here last night as the result of injuries suffered Tuesday in a grade crossing accident three miles north of Leland in northern Josephine county. An operation, performed in an effort to save the life of her unborn child, was unsuccessful. Mrs. Snell was injured when the automobile, driven by her husband, Francis E. Snell, was struck at the crossing by a northbound Southern Pacific passenger train. Mrs. Snell suffered minor injuries in the accident, and her two-year-old nephew, Francis Merle Wallace, received a broken leg and severe bruises, but is expected to recover. Following the accident the train crew brought the injured persons to Roseburg, halting the train at Glendale long enough to pick up a physician who gave first aid treatment on the way to the Roseburg hospital. Mrs. Snell's unborn child, a girl, taken immediately following the woman's death by means of a cesarean operation was dead when removed, physicians reported. Mrs. Snell was born in Josephine county, March 11, 1917. Surviving are her husband, her mother, Mrs. A. A. Whiteman of Bonanza, Oregon; two brothers, Clark Akin of Medford and Ernest Akin of Bonanza, and two sisters, Mrs. A. Conner and Annette Akin, both of Bonanza. The body was removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors and will be sent this afternoon to Grants Pass, where a funeral is to be held and where funeral services will be arranged.

FLYING MOLLISONS SPLIT IN TRIANGLE

CHELSEFIELD, England, Oct. 21.—(AP)—With a broken nose but a firm heart, Mrs. Amy Mollison announced today the famous "Flying Mollisons" will set solo maritime courses hereafter. She crashed her plane near here yesterday, wrecking the ship and fracturing her nose. "I've heard rumors about Jim for the past month," she said, referring to her husband. "Well, Jim is going his way and I am going mine. Hereafter, I shall fly under my own name as Amy Johnson." Amy's "forced landing" from domestic skyways left the status of two other members of the aerial triangle still up in the air—Jim Mollison and Mrs. Beryl Markham, the blonde English aviator who attempted a solo flight from England to New York and crashed in Nova Scotia, Sept. 5. Mrs. Markham described Mollison as a "very good friend," but British newspapers, at the time of the flight, hinted of a more romantic attachment.

ARMY GETS B'GOSH AIR BARN DANCE TO BE 'DINGER'

Cornstalks, bales of hay, live chickens and livestock are being assembled at the Roseburg armory. 'RED' CANDIDATE ROUTED BY CROWD

Eggs and Tomatoes Hurlled at Browder on Second Terre Haute Trip.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Driven to cover in his hotel by a belligerent crowd's rotten egg and tomato barrage, Earl Browder, communist candidate for president, considered in silence to any possible future plans for delivering his twice-thrown campaign address in this city. Browder lost a court decision today when Judge Albert Owens denied his petition for an injunction to restrain local authorities from interference with his speaking engagement here. The injunction petition was filed last week but action on it did not come until several hours after the time Browder had planned to broadcast his appeal for votes. He was prevented from entering radio station WBOV where he was scheduled to speak last night and at least three persons were injured in fist fights as a crowd of several hundred persons, surrounding the studio building, forced him to retreat in his taxicab, with his speech undelivered. Browder had just stepped from the cab and moved toward the building when the crowd closed in on him. He faced them for a moment as eggs and tomatoes were thrown at close range splattered over his clothing. Then he withdrew to the cab and returned to his hotel. Several fights broke out in the crowd as he departed. Protest Planned. Browder said later a protest would be sent to President Roosevelt. He said the affair was "a good thing for the civil rights of the people of Terre Haute and a bad thing for the so-called law and order league." Browder later released for publication the speech he was unable to make. In it he urged the American people to "stamp out the ty-

HULL RAPS LANDON ON FARM ADDRESS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Defending the reciprocal trade agreements made with foreign nations, Secretary of State Hull said in a statement published today that Governor Alf M. Landon "would have the farmer shut his eyes" to vast improvement in his welfare and base his vote on "wild misrepresentations." Hull replied to the republican candidate's recent speech in New Mexico after he had conferred yesterday with President Roosevelt. He said the governor "hopelessly misstates, confuses and jumbles the entire question pertaining to reciprocal trade policies and peace." "The simple story of the course of American agriculture is that during the administration prior to 1933 of such staple commodities as wheat, corn, hogs, dairy products, oats, soybeans, and the like, the level of their prices, and that farm income fell almost vertically; and that farm values suffered a similar decline. "In striking contrast, the cash income of the American farmer was in 1935 more than \$2,000,000,000 higher than the depression level of 1932, while the prices of wheat, corn, hog products, dairy products, oats and most other farm commodities doubled or trebled. In 1935, with the trade agreements in operation, farm income is increasing at the annual rate of about \$1,000,000,000. "On all of this Governor Landon is as silent as the grave."

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Harold Faughey, 29, of Longview, Wash., paralyzed in the lower limbs, by a bullet wound sustained in an attempted break from the county jail here on September 26, will be brought into circuit court tomorrow morning to receive sentence. Faughey had entered plea of guilty to four counts of robbery and assault.
