FAVORITE RECIPES

TURKEY GUMBO

NATALIE W. BAUM, Roseburg. Take left-over carcass of turkey, broken into pieces. Cover with cold water, bring slowly to the boiling point, then add 1 whole onion, few stalks of celery, and two slices of lemon and a bay leaf. Let all this simmer four or more hours. Strain and remove fat. Add 1 can (No. 2) okra, can pure tomatoes, seasoning. Add the scraps of turkey meat cut in small pieces, and slice or two of boiled ham cut also into small pieces. Then thicken slightly. To be served over dry rice in soup plates or individual small bowls.

CHIFFON PUMPKIN PIE

OPAL JONES, Wilbur. 2 eggs; 1 1/4 pts milk; 1 pt pumpkin; 1/4 c sugar; 1 t ginger; 1/2 t melted butter; 1/2 t nutmeg; 1/2 t cloves; 1 1/4 t cinnamon; 1/2 t salt. Mix the milk with the pumpkin. Add the dry ingredients to the sugar. Stir sugar mixture into pumpkin mixture, then add the egg yolks lightly mixed, but not beaten. Add the melted butter, then whites. Fill the crust within 1/2 in. of top. Bake for 30 min. in oven 350° F. The recipe makes 2 pies.

HARTH'S ALARM OVER 'POLIO' HELD UNNECESSARY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 21—(AP)—The Oregon state board of health, in commenting on recent inquiries concerning infantile paralysis, said today Oregon had experienced no epidemic of the disease since 1927 and that "it would seem . . . that the chances for infection in Oregon are less than in any other state."

In 1927, a total of 390 cases resulted in 86 deaths. Last year, 52 cases led to 19 deaths—the highest mortality since 1928. Thus far in 1936, 29 cases and 6 deaths have been reported. Two fatalities occurred in Portland and one each in Klamath, Lane, Marion and Washington counties.

The health board, in reporting that "the number of cases occurring annually in Oregon is less per capita than in any other western state if not the United States," said the statistics were issued today "in order that there should be no unnecessary alarm."
