EMPLOYMENT UP, LABOR BUREAU SAYS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Secretary Perkins estimated today 6,000,000 unemployed had found industrial jobs since March, 1933.

The labor department chief based her estimate on figures collected by the bureau of labor statistics from samples taken from the payrolls of all principal industries. Employment in September increased by 355,000 over August—the sixth successive monthly gain, she said. Weekly payrolls in September were \$2,500,000 greater than in August.

The employment report showed industrial payrolls had increased by more than 1,000,000 workers in the year ended October 1. Miss Perkins said, while payrolls had risen in the year nearly \$32,000,000 weekly.

Manufacturing employment, she said, now stood at 90.5 per cent of its 1923-25 average, the highest point since June, 1930.

The labor secretary expressed herself as particularly heartened by a 23.2 per cent increase in private building employment during the last year and continued gains in the durable goods industry.
