VEGETABLE SOUP

MRS. IRVIN H. MEYER
Roseburg, Ore.
3 bunches celery; 1 qt. tomato juice. Wash and mince celery. Steam thoroughly, and until most of water is cooked up. Add tomato juice.

BEAN PIE

MRS. ROY JONES, Melrose.
Cook white beans until well done. Rub through sieve. To 1 1/2 c bean pulp add 3/4 c brown sugar; 1/2 c cinnamon; 1/4 c ginger; 1/2 c salt; 2 c milk and 2 well beaten eggs. Lastly add 2 T melted butter. Bake as pumpkin pie and top with whipped cream.
