MADRID SHORT OF FOOD, DEFENSE WEAK, SCRIBES SAY

TALAVIERA DE LA REINA, Spain, Oct. 27.—(AP)—American newspaper correspondents, captured by fascists on an expedition from Madrid, described to their American colleagues today semi-starvation conditions reigning in the capital and declared: "It is quite possible the militia will run from Madrid when it is attacked. Madrid can be taken within two days."

The newspapermen, who were sent to Salamanca for questioning by Generalissimo Francisco Franco, told of continually retreating with the socialist forces in what they described as "complete routs" after recent battles on the Madrid front. They said long lines of food seekers were forming in Madrid with supplies limited. "There is no more butter," one of them said. "Meat, sugar and coffee are difficult to obtain. The highest priced restaurants sometimes only serve one dish such as mutton stew, which runs out before all the diners have been served."

"There are many trenches around Madrid," the correspondents added, "but they are nothing more than shallow ditches such as the militia deserted at Navalcarnero as soon as the Moors got within rifle range."

U. S. Flags Worn. The newspapermen, whose story gave the first uncensored picture of conditions in Madrid in many days, said all Americans in Madrid were wearing arm bands with the American flag stamped on them as a precaution against molestation. Because of the possibility of wild street fighting or what they described as "communist violence in desperation when Madrid falls," the correspondents said American officials in Madrid had advised all United States citizens to take immediate refuge in the embassy.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Testimony that her husband beat her "intermittently for six days," has won an annulment for Julia Gifford, former singer and one-time wife of Bob Fitzsimmons, pugilist. She testified that J. Anthony McGregor, café man, beat her until she gave him \$6,000 to pay a mortgage on his restaurant.

The 1936 budget for elections was eliminated entirely. A cut of \$1,000 was made in the fund for publishing and advertising, as there will be no publication of the tax foreclosures during the coming year.

The committee recommended an increase of \$24,000 in the county bridge fund, but partially offset this increase by a cut of \$16,523.60 in the road fund. Replacement of several old bridges will be required during the coming year, the court reported, and \$15,000 is estimated as necessary for a new bridge at Little canyon, to which site the court proposes to relocate the former highway bridge formerly spanning the South

Umpqua river at Winston. As all county bonds have been retired, it was possible to eliminate this item which was carried at \$4,005.44 in the 1936 budget. An increase of \$1,930 is proposed for the tax collection department, of which sum \$1,600 is recommended for the purchase of bookkeeping machines, urged for the past two years by the county auditors. An increase of \$586 is proposed in the sheriff's office for the purchase of an automobile. Other proposed increases include \$1,000 for assistance to the blind, \$1,217 for the county home, and \$1,000 to provide a fund of \$2,000 to make it possible to finish the work of property classification.

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NEW STATE NORMAL UNITS DEDICATED

MONMOUTH, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The new administration building and gymnasium at Oregon Normal school were officially entered as units of the Oregon higher education system today.

The recently completed structures were dedicated yesterday at the close of the October meeting of the board of higher education. Ceremonies were held in the historic building which will give way to the new administration hall. The 65-year-old edifice formerly housing the normal school executive offices was renamed Campbell hall to associate it with two early Oregon normal presidents, Franklin Campbell and his son Prince Lucian Campbell, who later became president of the University of Oregon.

The \$93,000 administration building and the \$62,000 physical education department are two of eight buildings added to the system.
