WORK UNDER R. A. AWAITING OPINION

SALEM, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Voluntary work agreements under the resettlement administration, whereby work can be performed upon public projects in Oregon, are now pending a ruling by the attorney general, Governor Martin announced here today. No work can be authorized without the ruling, the governor stated.

The announcement was made upon receipt of a letter from Walter A. Duffy, regional director of resettlement work at Portland, urging the executive to bring the matter again to the attention of the attorney general. He stated all was in readiness to start work. Opinions have already been handed down by the officials in Idaho and Washington and the projects there were under way, Duffy said.

The points upon which the attorney general must pass include what types of work can be performed under the workmen's compensation insurance, how much of the public funds can be used in paying premiums on the insurance, who should assume liabilities for injuries on the projects and other details relative to protection for the workers.

FARM PROFITS OF WEST CLIMBING UP

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Farmers of the far west drew marked attention today in the federal reserve bank's report on the economic progress of the Pacific area. The bank's monthly summary commented that "current indications point toward a larger income for the farmers than in any year since 1930."

Agricultural markets were favorable during September and early October, and weather aided harvesting. The bulk of this district's harvesting has been completed, with production exceeding forecasts, and also exceeding last year's total.

Livestock sales have been greater than last year. Prices for most farm products were higher than last year and better than since 1930.

Other highlights of the twelfth reserve district—including California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Utah, Nevada and part of Arizona—include:

Industrial activity receded somewhat—largely in the California canning operations. Trade was well maintained. A reduction in non-residential building cut down the total of building permits slightly.

Oregon employment increased, largely on account of expanding canning operations. California factory employment receded after pausing the canning season peak.

Indexes of department store sales and freight carloadings advanced, while new automobile sales, furniture sales and inter-coastal traffic declined.

RED BLUFF BRIDGE SPAN COLLAPSES

RED BLUFF, Calif., Oct. 27.—(AP)—One span of the 29-E highway bridge over the Sacramento river collapsed today but two truck drivers escaped with minor injuries although their machines plunged 26 feet into the water.

Ray Williams, 26, of Sacramento, and Charles Huron, 36, of Port Chicago, were bruised. They were driving gasoline trucks when the span fell.

The entire span, over the eastern entrance to the city, fell into the

river, and traffic was being routed on the west side highway. The bridge was built in 1934.

REV. W. R. BAIRD ACCEPTS NEW CALL

The Rev. W. R. Baird, former pastor of the First Christian church of Roseburg, who has held the pastorate at the Medford Christian church for the past six years, has resigned his position to accept a call to the Christian church at Modesto, Calif. He will leave for his new location late in November. His family will remain in Medford until the close of the school year.

WORK UNDER R. A. AWAITING OPINION

SALEM, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Voluntary work agreements under the resettlement administration, whereby work can be performed upon public projects in Oregon, are now pending a ruling by the attorney general, Governor Martin announced here today. No work can be authorized without the ruling, the governor stated.

The announcement was made upon receipt of a letter from Walter A. Duffy, regional director of resettlement work at Portland, urging the executive to bring the matter again to the attention of the attorney general. He stated all was in readiness to start work. Opinions have already been handed down by the officials in Idaho and Washington and the projects there were under way, Duffy said.

The points upon which the attorney general must pass include what types of work can be performed under the workmen's compensation insurance, how much of the public funds can be used in paying premiums on the insurance, who should assume liabilities for injuries on the projects and other details relative to protection for the workers.
