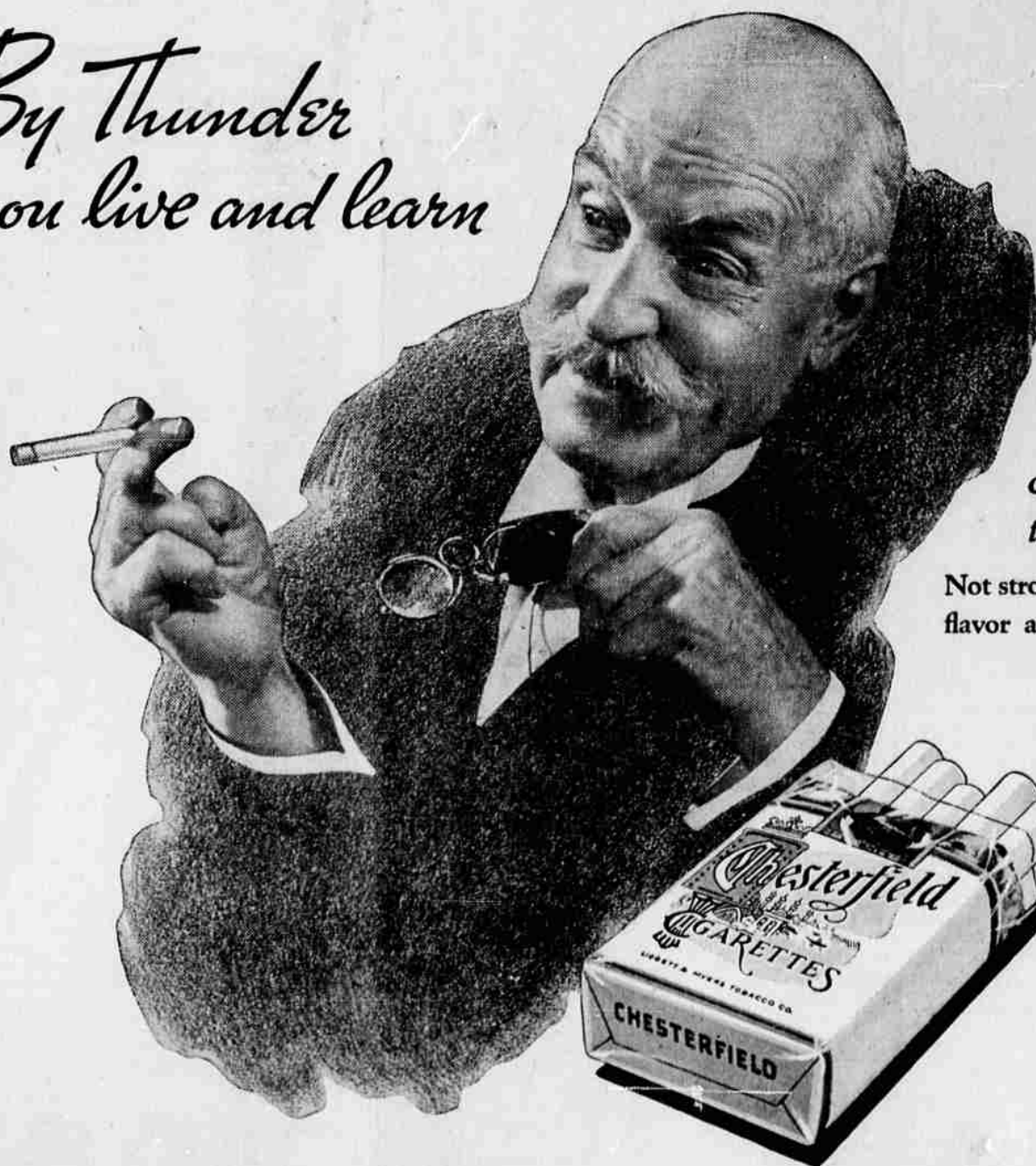
CORN AND POTATO CHOWDER

MRS. A. E. EASTON, Myrtle Creek
1 1/2 cup chopped celery
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 cup diced raw potatoes
1 cup canned corn
1 1/4 cups water
Salt and pepper to taste
4 tablespoons melted butter
2 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk, scalded
Cook celery, onion, potatoes and corn with water until tender. Add salt and pepper. Mix flour with melted butter and stir into the vegetable mixture to thicken. Cook 10 minutes. Add scalded milk and cook one minute.

PHILADELPHIA MERINGUE PIE

MRS. ELEFT CELLERS
Dixonville, Ore.
MRS. HESTON GROSS, Roseburg.
2 1/4 c rhubarb (washed or fresh)
1 T sugar (brown if fresh, white if needed)
1 T butter
3 T flour
1 egg
1 cup hot water
Put rhubarb, sugar and butter in square pan over slow heat and bring to boil. Make a thickening of the flour and egg. Add to rhubarb and cook until it is thick. Remove from fire. Pour in to 1 baked pie crust, cover with meringue and brown quickly in a hot oven, or bake with 2 crusts. Serves 6.
