ALBINO DEER TOO WARY FOR HUNTERS

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Oct. 27.—(AP)—An almost legendary albino deer, known to hunters as "Old Tri-Motor," after 12 years at its haunts, alarmed of Kendrick mountain, northeast of here, with his surprising appearance and equally fantastic escapes from death.

The big buck, white either from age or albino ancestry, has been known to hunters for at least 12 years and still makes sporadic appearances in the forest, if recent reports are to be believed.

Many have hunted "Old Tri-Motor," but without success. Twice he has been wounded and once dogs were set on his trail, but each time he sped to safety.

Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Knoles Sr., of Flagstaff on a hunting trip four years ago spotted the white-coated buck. Knoles emptied the magazine of his rifle, but the deer sped away as if it had wings. So

cleanly did it jump over Jackpines that another member of the party declared nothing but a tri-motor airplane could do such a stunt. From that time the deer has been known as "Old Tri-Motor."

Hunters returned this week with reports of having seen the big animal.

Ken Webber of Flagstaff declared the buck "has whiskers as long and white as a billy goat which flow back as it soars over the tree tops like the canvas sails of a clipper."

Others said there must be some mistake since they had never seen a deer with whiskers, but Webber stuck to his story.

BILL AMENDING OLD AGE ASSISTANCE ACT OF 1935—Purpose: Amending 1935 old age assistance act reducing the eligible age for assistance from 70 to 65; amending it to comply with the Federal social security act which provides for payment by the United States of money for old age assistance upon the state matching such payments and meeting certain other conditions; relieving counties from contributing to such assistance; providing for state and United States paying equal amounts; ratifying county taxes heretofore levied for old age pensions and diverting them to other county relief; diverting the \$1,000,000 appropriated by the 1935 act for old age assistance to other general needy relief. Vote YES or NO

TAX LIMITATION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT FOR SCHOOL DISTRICTS HAVING 100,000 POPULATION—Purpose: To amend the constitutional 6 per cent tax limitation to authorize any school district having over 100,000 population to levy taxes for the year 1937 amounting, exclusive of levies directly authorized by the legal voters of the district, not to exceed 80 per cent of the total 1932 levy of such district; also, in computing the amount of levy permissible in such district for 1937 and subsequent years, the amount of mandatory levies required by law shall be excluded.
