

ARMSTRONG GETS NOD OVER BELLOISE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 28.—(AP)—Matchmaker Joe Waterman of the Olympic auditorium started negotiations today, hoping to land a bout between Percy Barrow, Birmingham, and Henry Armstrong, Los Angeles, for the undisputed featherweight championship of the world.

Armstrong won a promised fight with the national boxing association champion last night when he took a slim four-round decision over Mike Belloise of New York.

The principals spent most of the evening chipping blows in close, Armstrong's aggressive, constant swinging earned Roth's approval, but drew a sharp division of favor from the packed house of 10,400.

Standing in close, heads together—the ninth round was fought almost entirely in Belloise's corner. Armstrong undoubtedly threw the most blows. Belloise caught most of them on his arms, elbows and shoulders. He swung less, but made his punches count more.

Aside from a split eyelid, the New Yorker emerged unmarked. Armstrong was cut about both eyes, one an old wound, his eyebrows were puffed and he bled freely from the nose and mouth throughout most of the bout.

The Associated Press carded the bout a draw, with an edge, if any, to Belloise for more effective blows. Twice, notably in the eighth, he straightened Armstrong up and connected with a short right to the chin that made the negro wobble unsteadily.

ARTHUR BUCK LEADS FOOTBALL SCORERS

WAUPESHA, Wis., Oct. 28.—(AP)—Carroll college statisticians came out of a huddle today with the record of Arthur Buck, their junior triple-threat quarterback, showing his 73 points gave him the leadership among the nation's college football scorers for the season to date.

While Bob Davis of Kentucky, leader the previous week with 66 points, came out of a huddle today with an injury last Saturday, Buck scored 15 points on two touchdowns and three placements as Carroll trimmed Lawrence college, 24 to 9. In five games this year, Buck scored ten touchdowns, ten points after touchdowns and a field goal. Undeclared and untied in five games, Carroll has scored 112 points this season against opponents' 6.



PACIFIC COAST FOOTBALL NEWS

SEATTLE, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The return of John Wiatrak, star center, to the University of Washington's first string line buoyed Husky hopes today as the gridiron clash with the University of Oregon at Portland.

Wiatrak did not play against California being out with injuries. Bud Erickson, second string center, subbed in fine fashion and stamped himself a dependable reserve for the post.

Frank Mattes, guard, and Carl Matrone, reserve end, were on the sidelines. Mattes with a leg injury and Matrone with a slight "charley horse."

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 28.—(AP)—Oregon's lineup and passing, weakened all season by injuries, will be back at par Saturday for the Portland game with the Washington Huskies.

With Tom Blackman, sophomore fullback ready to start, the Webfoots are certain of at least one man who can both throw and punt.

Blackman has been on the sidelines since the first conference battle of the year and in his absence the Webfoots have been able to complete but three passes—one against Idaho and two against Washington State.

Against Washington the powerful L. Sekman will be supported by Arleigh Bentley at quarter, Dale Lasselle and Bob Braddock, halfbacks.

The team's spirits are on the rebound after the loss to the Cougars. Oregon's traditional "jinx" over Washington in the past has inspired the squad to football for superior to anything the season's record would indicate.

CORVALLIS, Oct. 28.—(AP)—A two-way battle was under way at Bell field between reserves seeking the position left vacant in the Oregon State lineup by Dale Lillebo, veteran end.

Lillebo, who has captained the Beavers in the majority of games this season is off the squad indefinitely with a head injury. Joe Wendick and Weldon Wedlin are first in line to take over the

job for the Montana game Saturday.

McMINNVILLE, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The chances of a Linfield victory over Whitman college at Walla Walla Saturday suffered a setback with the loss of two outstanding players for the remainder of the schedule.

Injuries and ineligibilities will cost the services of Ted Hipp, guard, and Hal Votaw, quarterback. Hipp is out with a bad shoulder while Votaw will be kept from playing through an eligibility protest which will not be settled until conference officials meet.

ALBANY, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Deferred not to meet the same fate twice, Coach Faber of Albany college strove to construct an effective pass defense for the Oregon Normal school contest Thursday night.

Albany was beaten last week when it failed to stop a brilliant aerial offensive played by Southern Oregon normal.

Al Peterson, tackle, received a broken nose against the Sons and probably will not meet the Wolves.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Another strenuous pass defense drill confronted the Bruins of U. C. L. A. today as the coaching staff aimed at stopping Stanford's feared overhead attack here Saturday.

Coch Spaulding is mindful that the Bruins have been weaker against passing this year than in previous years and hopes to correct the matter before the weekend engagement.

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 28.—(AP)—Development of a passer and the return of an injured mainstay bolstered Washington State college football team as it prepared for a conference game with California at Berkeley Saturday.

Carl Littlefield, fullback, has turned out to be an excellent passer, and in answering Coach Hollingbery's cry for an aerial attack. He shoots them fast and accurately.

Bob Campbell, 180-pound guard here in the Southern California

game, reported for work yesterday, and will be in the lineup Saturday.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Without injuries, the University of Idaho Vandals, secured a stiff workout today for their non-conference football game with Gonzaga university at Spokane Saturday.

Despite the Bulldog's defeat of the University of San Francisco last Sunday, Coach Baile expressed belief Gonzaga is the team to give Idaho its first victory since it walloped Whitman in the opening game of the season, 25 to 6. Since that time the Vandals have scored only once—against Nevada Saturday. Nevada won, 7 to 6.

PALO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 28.—(AP)—Glenn Hamilton, fullback who injured a leg in the Washington State game, only watched Stanford's Indiana Vandal today for their clash with U. C. L. A. Saturday. Coach "Tiny" Thornhill said the pass-throwing ace will be unable to play, although he can run with the aid of a knee brace.

INDIANS DRILL FOR MARSHFIELD FOES

The Roseburg senior high school Indians, who tangle with Marshfield high school in a football game on Friday field Friday night, are getting some hard drilling this week on pass defense.

The Marshfield team is reported to be one of the best high school passing teams in the southern part of the state and defense against aerial assaults is one of the weakest features of the Roseburg team. However, the Redskins showed much improvement in pass defense against University high last week, and hope to be able to stop the air threat of the Coos Bay team.

Marshfield holds a 7 to 0 victory over Tillamook, but lost to Medford 33 to 13; to Myrtle Point, 26 to 6 and to Coquille, 14 to 7. All of Marshfield's touchdowns have been scored from passes. Medford won from Roseburg 33 to 0, which would indicate Roseburg and Marshfield to be about equal in defensive strength against running attacks.

Coach Hod Turner will be lacking the services of Ridgeway, 200-pound center and Fausette, the driving fullback. Ridgeway suffered a nose injury in the Medford game and has developed an infection which will keep him out of Friday night's game. Fausette is still suffering from a sore shoulder, hurt in the game at Medford.

GRID TOLL SAME AS LAST YEAR'S MARK

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Football in 1936 is taking approximately the same toll of life that it did a year ago and once more most of the deaths are attributable to sand lot and high school games.

The records so far this season show 18 deaths which have been reported from the gridiron and 23 fatalities among football players since Jan. 1. At the same stage of the 1935 season the toll stood at 17.

GRID POLI. PLACES MINNESOTA FIRST

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(AP)—To the surprise of none, it's unanimous this week for Minnesota in the Associated Press college football ranking poll.

This Galloping Gopher received the No. 1 vote of all 44 expert contributors to the second weekly poll from the key points of observation from coast to coast.

The main race, for second place, was won by Pittsburgh's Panthers, who rebounded at the expense of

Notre Dame with a display of rushing power rated only a few notches below the performance of Minnesota.

Minnesota's dominant position is emphasized by the fact three of the Gopher victims, Washington, Nebraska and Purdue, still are ac-

cording relatively high ratings. Each of the three has been beaten only by Bernie Bierman's marvelous machine.
