Board Makes Denial

Declaring it had issued no regulations and authorized no posters, the board said it felt a duty to bring these posters to the attention of the department of justice for investigation as to authorship and responsibility for circulation.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, said the law would enable workers to face old age with a feeling of security.

ELECTION LAW VIOLATION CHARGED TO MANUFACTURER

DES MOINES, Iowa, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Arrested on a charge of violating Iowa election laws by distributing in pay envelopes unsolicited notices "tending to create sentiment against President Roosevelt," Albert Penn, Des Moines manufacturer, struck back today at the complaint.

The Penn Electric Switch company president issued a statement declaring "as I understand it I was not arrested because I did not tell the truth but because my prosecutor decided" that the notices, criticizing the social security law, had damaged "Mr. Roosevelt's political chances."

President J. C. Lewis of the Iowa Federation of Labor signed the complaint which led to Penn's arrest.

Municipal Judge Charles Cooter fixed Nov. 12 as the date for the manufacturer's hearing.

Statement Cited

An exhibit attached to the complaint was a photostatic copy of a Penn company pay envelope bearing this statement:

"Pay reduction—effective January, 1937, we are compelled by a Roosevelt 'new deal' law to make a one per cent reduction from your wages and turn it over to the government. Finally this may go as high as three per cent."

"You might get this money back in future years—but only if congress decided to make an appropriation for that purpose. There is no guarantee. Decide before November 3—election day—whether you wish to take these chances."

Federal Conciliator Fitzgerald predicted: "Probably there will not be any strike at all."

ALL SHIPS AT PORTLAND, SAVE ONE, BEING WORKED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29.—(AP)—Threatened paralysis of waterfronts failed to materialize in Portland today and with one exception all ships were being worked.

Longshoremen said they had received no notice to strike.

Cooks and stewards aboard the Watsonville said they were waiting definite word from San Francisco relative to the scheduled tie-up before serving meals and the vessel remained inactive.

Another labor controversy, between the teamsters' union and non-union drivers of common carrier apple trucks, appeared on the way to new repercussions when Al Rosser, secretary of the teamsters' union, said longshoremen would decline to handle cargo to which teamsters objected.

"We picked that dock and those apples as soon as one of these common carrier goes in there with a non-union driver, and the longshoremen have promised me they will not touch this kind of cargo," Rosser said.

Not Aimed at Farmers

The controversy reached a climax Wednesday when teamsters objected to the unloading of some of the apple trucks from the Hood River area, claiming a portion was comprised of common carriers manned by non-union men. Rosser said the move was not aimed at farmers bringing their own produce in their own trucks.

The trucks have been escorted in the city by Portland police and have been watched on the trip en route to and from Hood River by state patrolmen.

Several loads of apples were brought here yesterday and more were expected today.

Officials of the Oceanic terminal said apples would be accepted unless and until a waterfront tie-up began.

WOOD TICK VICTIM REPORTED BETTER

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Hospital attendants said today Hamilton F. Corbett, president of the Portland chamber of commerce, spent a "good night" and that his condition was "somewhat improved." He has been undergoing treatment for spotted fever, contracted from the bite of a wood tick while he was on a hunting trip.

U. S. POPULATION NOW 128 MILLION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—(AP)—United States population on July 1 was reported by Secretary Roper to be 128,429,000, an increase of 908,000 over July 1, 1935.

Roper told his press conference the increase resulted largely from an excess of births over deaths, net immigration for the year ended July 1 being only about 8,000.

MADRID, WITH AID, DOWN 17 PLANES

was asserted, dropped a deadly rain of 250-pound bombs on fascist banners "where planes were being repaired and where those recently delivered from foreign countries were being assembled."

Women Exuberant.

Heartened by these triumphs, however distant, women ran alongside the newly mobilized column of 35,000 civilians as it marched through the streets to the defense of the siege-ridden capital itself, exhorting them:

"Fight to the death! Victory is yours!"

Caballero's assurances imparted a distinct atmosphere of optimism to residents who had feared the insurgents' so far superior aerial equipment.

At the same time, officers commanding frontline units reported government militiamen were "impatient" to launch a new counter-offensive with their backs to the gates of Madrid.

The government hoped to pry the insurgent military pincers wide open and demoralize the besiegers in one giant thrust.

Land Forces Triumphant

Mearer advances trickling in from the battlefield south of the capital indicated a government offensive had begun at 6 a. m. at Segura, that the town of Torrejon had been recaptured and that the important highway point of Alcala was being approached.

A series of advances by government troops in the extreme northern and eastern sectors also were claimed by the Madrid authorities.

These included:

1. Capture of the towns of Caldas, Vega, Obarca and Somiedo, with 300 insurgents killed, 56 prisoners taken and 15 machine-guns and 200 rifles seized.

2. Counter-attacking in the San Claudio sector, government troops were reported to have killed 1,000 insurgents.

3. The "reconquest" of Oviedo was declared to be nearly complete.

4. Insurgent defenders of Hesca, the government said, were short of munitions and "on the verge of despair" in the absence of promised reinforcements.

There also were reports from government defenders of Bilbao that insurgent planes had bombed the hospital Marquina, and from Belchite that 200 government sympathizers, men, women and children, had been lined up and executed by insurgent firing squads.

The Madrid press commented favorably on Caballero's orders that prisoners must be respected.

In the capital, 2,000 women volunteered to substitute for street car motormen who have been mustered into the militia ranks.

ITALIAN SUB-BOATS TO HELP REBELS, CHARGED

PARIS, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The Spanish embassy announced today it had confidential information that a fleet of Italian submarines is awaiting sailing orders at Genoa, Italy, to establish blockade of the Catalonian coast and perhaps attack the Spanish government stronghold.

An embassy spokesman, warning that the civil war on the Iberian peninsula might at any moment break out into a grave international conflict, said the information came from "an absolutely trustworthy source."

He said the submarines may join in a combined sea-air attack on autonomous, government-supporting Catalonia. President Manuel Azana now has established offices at Barcelona, capital of the region.

The Spanish spokesman also reiterated previous charges that Italy had landed a large number of troops on the Balearic island of Mallorca, which, he said, may be destined for use against Catalonia.

These troops, the spokesman charged, are supported by 112 Italian airplanes.

Russian Aid Rumored

French sympathizers with the Spanish government have charged that Italy and Germany reached a secret understanding, during the recent visit to Berlin of Italian Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano, for common action in the Spanish situation.

One of their first moves, some French newspapers have asserted, will be recognition by both powers

of the fascist administration of Gen. Francisco Franco, probably immediately after the expected fall of Madrid.

On the other hand, the rightist press, hostile to the leftist Madrid administration, has printed reports that Russian ships loaded with arms and provisions were en route to Spain to help the Madrid government.

Insurgent radio stations in Spain have filled the air with assertions that Russia already has supplied the Madrid troops with large quantities of machine guns and ammunition; dozens of Russian air-planes, and two balloons.

The parents were fined \$500 and given six-months jail terms several weeks ago as a result of injuries received by the infant.

erage advance in food costs since 1932 was 24 per cent, but this compared with an average rise in factory payrolls of 77 per cent, which meant that the incomes of all city dwellers had "gone up faster and farther than food prices have gone up."

"To sum up, he said, the 'Republican Market-Basket of 1932' costs less but the American consumer did not have the cash to fill it. Our market basket in 1936 has much in it because people have money in their pockets to fill it with."

"Interdependence Works"

Asserting there is often too wide a spread between what the farmer gets and what the consumer pays, he said the administration was "engaged in solving" that difficulty through "interdependence."

"Through twelve years the republicans have proved that sectionalism will not work," he asserted. "We have proved in three and a half years that interdependence does work."

Speaking in Wilkes-Barre's miners park, the chief executive addressed a large applauding crowd of anthracite workers and their families.

Security Plan Defended

Leading up to his statement about security "propaganda," he asserted:

"No employer has a right to put his political preferences in the pay envelope. That is coercion even if he tells the whole truth. But this propaganda misrepresents by telling only half the truth. Labor and a fair-minded public must place such tactics in a class with the coercion of the strong-armed squad and the whispering of the labor spy."

After cautioning to "get these facts straight," Mr. Roosevelt went on to say the social security law calls upon the employer to put up three dollars to every one dollar for the employee for old age and unemployment insurance.

"Three for one," he exclaimed. "There's the rub. That is what these propaganda-spreading employers object to. These propagandists are driven in their desperation to the contemptible, unpatriotic suggestion that some future congress will steal these insurance funds for other purposes."

"If they really believe what they say in the pay envelopes, they have no confidence in our form of government or its permanence. It might be well for them to move to some other nation in which they have greater faith."

In reading his prepared speech, the president added politicians and

newspapers to the "handful" of employers he said were misleading labor on the social security act. Paying tribute to the late mine union organizer, John Mitchell, for whose memory the day had been set aside, the president said, Mitchell pioneered in his day for collective bargaining.

"Today," he added, "we have put upon the statute books the legal mechanism to make collective bargaining a reality."
