Landon's Chances of Carrying Western States Seem to Depend Principally On Doubtful Strength of Townsend Plan

(By the Associated Press.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28.—Governor Alf M. Landon's hope of carrying the far west rests largely upon the doubtful strength of the Townsend old age pension movement.

Landon's dash to Los Angeles for an address last week followed closely an appeal by the pension plan leader, Dr. F. E. Townsend of Long Beach, Calif., to his California followers to support the republican nominee.

Previously Dr. Townsend declared he favored election of the Union party candidate, Representative William Lemke of North Dakota. But in California the Union party failed to qualify for the ballot.

In the Townsend National Weekly Dr. Townsend said this move was intended to throw the presidential election into the house of representatives—where it would be should no candidate receive a majority electoral votes. The weekly printed a table showing how Roosevelt could get 214, Landon 213, and Lemke 164 electoral votes.

This table on western states gave Washington, Idaho, California and Colorado to Landon on the basis of Townsend strength; also Arizona, Nevada, Utah, Oregon and Wyoming. It listed Montana for Roosevelt.

California Demos Lead.
But California, with the largest registration in its history has 68.84 per cent or 1,882,014 democrats compared with 1,244,507 republicans—better than 60 per cent of the major party registration. Townsend organizations endorsed 20 candidates for congressional nominations in the state primary. Eleven of them won.

Oregon's democratic registrations have increased \$3,000, but are still about 41,000 under the republican. Senator Charles E. McNary defeated a Townsendite in the republican primary, and his principal adversary now is Willis Mahoney, democrat who has the asserted Townsend support.

Washington's democratic governor, Clarence D. Martin, wealthy flour miller, seeks re-election. Opposing him is ex-Governor Roland H. Hartley, Everett lumberman, who is campaigning against what he calls "labor racketeering" in the Seattle area, where a newspapermen's strike led to suspension of the Post-Intelligencer, a Hearst property.

Borah Non-Committal.
Idaho Townsendites generally are supporting Lemke for president. Senator William E. Borah, seeking a sixth term, is opposed by democratic Governor C. Ben Ross, chief executive for three consecutive two-year terms. Borah has mentioned Roosevelt favorably in addresses but has not urged his re-election; he likewise has commented favorably on Lemke, but has made little reference to Landon.

Nevada's registration includes 36,207 democrats to 19,971 republicans. The republican campaign has opposed the administration's range policy, fought the security exchange commission as a hindrance to mining, and challenged federal expenditures in general.

Arizona has approximately 85 per cent of its 167,000 voters registered as democrats. Landon, Colonel Frank Knox, and John D. M. Hamilton all have visited during the campaign. The democrats have depended upon local leaders.

Utah Campaign Quiet.
Utah has had a quiet campaign. Neither senate seat is open. Republicans, democrats, union, socialist, prohibition, and communist electors qualified for the presidential ballot. The gubernatorial fight lies largely among Governor Henry

H. Blood, democrat; Ray E. Dillman, republican attorney, and Mayor Harman W. Peery of Ogden, progressive-independent.

Montana has been nearly submerged in a flood of words about water. One phase of the fight over agricultural policies, and the Canadian reciprocal treaty, Senator James E. Murray, democrat seeking re-election, is opposed by T. O. Larson, republican, and Joseph P. Monaghan, independent progressive and Townsendite. Representative Roy E. Ayers, democrat, and Frank A. Hazelbaker, republican, seek the governorship.

Wyoming G. O. P. Leads.
Wyoming registration favors the republicans, 36,260 to 33,977, but late registrants do not state party leanings so the figures are incomplete. The current campaign has been quiet. Senator Robert D. Carey, republican, is opposed for re-election by H. H. Schwartz, democrat.

Colorado registration totals are not compiled officially, but democratic candidates were elected in 1932 and 1934. Senatorial candidates are Governor Ed C. Johnson, democrat, and Raymond L. Sauter, republican. The latter has been embarrassed by action of state candidates in eliminating from the state platform a specific endorsement of a constitutional amendment providing \$45 a month minimum old age pensions, and indirectly endorsing the Townsend plan. Although Johnson in the past criticized some new deal policies, particularly on relief, he has publicly pledged his loyalty to President Roosevelt and seems assured of unified democratic support.
