

LOW S. P. FARES TO PREVAIL IN WINTER

"Virtually the same low fares as our summer excursion roundtrips will be on sale all this winter," was the announcement of J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of Southern Pacific, in commenting on the railroad new winter tariff.

"Right now we offer first-class roundtrips east via California that cost the same as our low summer first-class fares. WHOLESALE PORK PRICES GO DOWN

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Declines in wholesale fresh pork prices ranging from 20 to 25 per cent and slight changes in wholesale quotations of most cured pork items were features of the live-stock and meat trade in October, the Institute of American meat packers reported today.

Increased marketing of hogs, especially in lighter weights, influenced the price decline, the institute pointed out. Prices of most weights of hogs dropped 5 to 10 per cent.

Wholesale beef prices registered slight declines early in the month but prices at the end of October were somewhat higher on highly finished grades than a month ago, but were somewhat lower on less finished grades.

Production of all meat was estimated 15 to 20 per cent larger than in October, 1935.

COUZENS ESTATE TO YIELD HEAVY TAX

DETROIT, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Giles Kavanagh, United States collector of internal revenue, said today the federal government would receive through inheritance taxes almost two-thirds of United States Senator James Couzens' estate, estimated by an administrator at between \$25,000,000 and \$30,000,000.

Kavanagh said total federal taxes on a \$30,000,000 estate would be \$15,500,000. Thomas C. Jacques, probate court registrar, estimated state inheritance taxes at \$2,400,000.

Aims and Benefits of Navy Day Described By Lieut. Hart to Douglas County Club

October 27th was selected as Navy day because it is the anniversary of the birth of the late President Theodore Roosevelt, so much of whose life was devoted to establishing a sound naval policy for the United States, and because October is the month in which the American Navy was founded in 1775 by the Continental congress.

These and other facts concerning Navy day and its meaning were presented before high school assemblies in Roseburg Friday by Robert I. Hart, Lieut. U. S. N., retired, speaking under the auspices of the Douglas County Navy club.

"In addition to paying a deserved tribute to the sea heroes of the nation and recalling the splendid part the navy has played in making and keeping us a nation, the Navy day observance has proved a valuable means of fostering a better understanding of the navy and its work," Lieut. Hart said.

After outlining the history of attempted naval limitation agreements, the speaker called attention to the great unrest prevailing among nations, and declared that the navy is the first line of defense.

Industries Aided — "Many Americans," he said, "feel that the navy is of primary concern to them only as taxpayers. But there is a greater investment of the American people in their navy. It is a part of the life of the nation. All material that goes into the fabrication of the American naval vessel is either the product of American soil or industry, and often of both. Only about forty per cent of the cost of the ship is expended in the building yard. Materials going into construction come from every state in the union. Eighty per cent of the ultimate

cost of the battleship goes to American wage earners, thus helping the crisis of unemployment and preserving the high American standard of living.

One Tug Named Umpqua — "Each of our battleships is named after one of the forty-eight states. Swift cruisers are named for American cities. Destroyers are named for some illustrious naval hero. Mine sweepers are named after birds, and our large seagoing tugs are named after our Indian tribes. It may interest the

Let the Board Decide

Military training is a college course for men. Whether or not it should be compulsory is an administrative detail for the decision of the state board of higher education, just as that board decides upon other compulsory courses such as courses in English and certain language requirements for college degrees. Let the Boys Earn

Upper class students are paid \$229.30 each by the government for taking the military course which enables many poor boys to continue in school to graduation. This costs the state of Oregon nothing. The passage of the non-compulsory military training bill would deprive hundreds of young men from the opportunity of completing a college education.

Glamour of War Destroyed

Young men getting a free education at the expense of the taxpayers should assume the responsibility of keeping the country out of war. They owe it to the state to train themselves to prevent wars, and to prevent invasion. Military instruction destroys all romantic glamour of war, yet trains the man to defend his home if necessity arises. Three hours a week, only one of which is drill, is little to ask in return for the hundreds of dollars the taxpayer gives him for an education.

To abandon military training in Oregon colleges would mean the eventual elimination of the reserve officer personnel in this state. College training is the only means of creating reserve officers, a vital part of our national defense system.
