

Huskies-Trojans Clash Tops Coast Football Games

Neither Team Beaten Thus
Far in 1936 Race; Oregon
to Battle U. C. L. A.
at Portland.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Washington's Huskies and the Trojans of Southern California, both unbeaten in the Pacific coast conference race, face stern tests tomorrow from teams which showed first sparks of power last Saturday.

Stanford, which provided the west's big upset last week-end by thrumping University of California at Los Angeles, meets Washington at Palo Alto and the Trojans clash with California in the Los Angeles coliseum.

The Indians struck U. C. L. A. from the conference running, 19 to 6, with a barrage of passes for their first win of the season. They have practiced in high spirits, determined to knock the Huskies from conference leadership.

Washington, seeking its sixth straight conference victory, is heavily favored.

California, which showed a surprisingly powerful attack in losing 14 to 13 to Washington state, will give the Trojans a high stumbling block before they meet Washington next week-end. Southern California, with only a scoreless tie with Washington state to mar its record, had an open date last Saturday.

U. C. L. A.'s Bruins will attempt to revive their shattered hopes in a battle at Portland with the rugged University of Oregon Webbs, who displayed a great defensive power in holding Washington to a 7 to 0 victory last Saturday and Washington state to a single field goal win the week before.

Oregon State, in the conference cellar, tackles the unbeaten Washington State Cougars at Pullman. The Beavers broke their losing

streak Saturday by beating Montana, 14 to 7.

In a non-conference skirmish here, the St. Mary's Gaels, back from a disastrous eastern campaign, clash with the vandals of Idaho, victors over Gonzaga, 18 to 7, last week.

Idaho may be no set-up for the Gaels, who wanted a breathing spell before the traditional battle with Santa Clara next Sunday.

GRAY AND DUNCAN OUT OF OREGON STATE LINEUP

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Optimism retreated hurriedly from the immediate vicinity of the Oregon State football team today along with Halfback Joe Gray and Quarterback Bill Duncan.

These backfield axes, counted upon heavily to bring an upset victory against Washington State at Pullman Saturday, were reported out of the lineup with injuries.

Coneh Stiner said the boys were "unfit physically for any football game this week."

Gray has an injured ankle and Duncan a bad knee.

Revolving his first string, Stiner expected to start Holly Holcomb in Duncan's job and either Bob Mountain or Ray Woodman for Gray.

CAMPBELL BACK IN COUGAR LINE; FLETCHER STILL OUT

PULLMAN, Wash., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Washington State college football stock received another boost today in the announcement that Campbell, tough 200-pound guard, would be back in the lineup for tomorrow's Oregon State game here.

Campbell, a starter in the early games, was injured in the Southern California game three weeks ago.

Coach Hollingbery reported the squad at top strength, except for Halfback Bob Fletcher, lost for the season with a knee dislocation.

Joe Angelo, rugged sophomore fullback, is favored to step into the backfield gap. Fullback Rodger Dougherty will shift to Fletcher's post beside Halfback Carl Littlefield and Quarterback Ed Goddard.

Washington State beat the Beavers last year, 26-13.

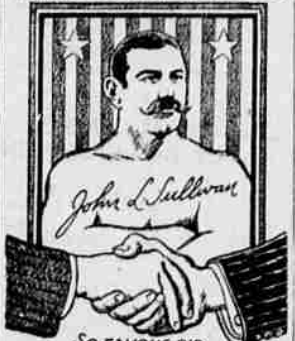
