Judge George K. Quine was born May 13, 1862, at Quine's creek between Riddle and Gladland, the son of William H. Quine and Elizabeth Mynatt Quine. He is now seventy-four years of age. His father first came west in 1846 to fight in the Mexican war and then returned to Kentucky to marry Elizabeth Mynatt and bring her as a bride to Oregon in 1852. They settled between Riddle and Gladland and the Quine creek was named for Judge Quine's father, Judge Quine's mother was born in Tennessee.

Mrs. George K. Quine, who was Della Riddle, was born to George W. Riddle (former commander of the Oregon soldiers' home) and Anna Rice Riddle at Glenbrook farm, near Riddle, February 6, 1866, and is now seventy years of age. Her father was born in Springfield, Ill., and came west in 1852. Her mother was born in Putnam, Ill., and crossed the plains in 1853.

Judge and Mrs. Quine were married at Glenbrook farm, November 7, 1886. To this union six children were born, including Harold and Ralph, who have passed away, and Mrs. Roy Catching, Mrs. R. D. Coen, Kenneth and H. D. Quine, all residents of Roseburg.
