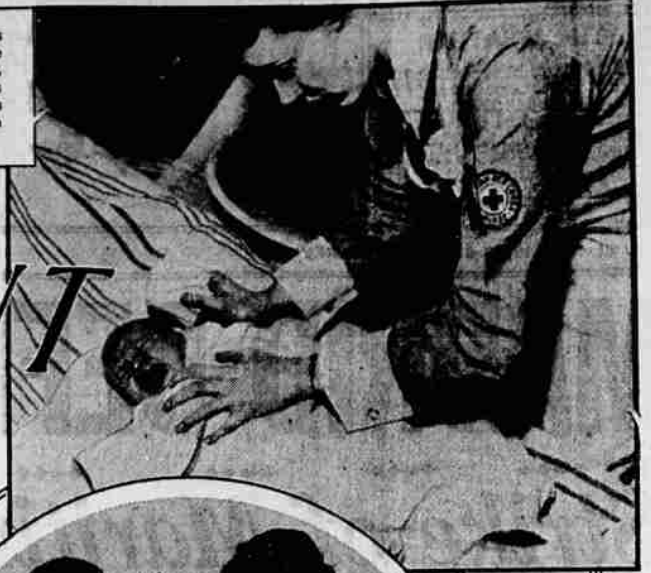

WIFE OF COMEDIAN OLIVER HARDY SUES

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Oliver Hardy is another of the wives of screen comedians who think, or have thought, their husbands not funny in their presence.

Mrs. Hardy disclosed her sentiments in a suit for separate maintenance on file today against the round-faced former Georgia vaudeville actor whose earnings, she claims, now are \$2,500 a week.

Hardy thus joins a long line of screen laughmakers who have been unable to make their wives see continually the funny side of things. In the list is his own partner, Stan Laurel, who now faces two separate maintenance suits, one from his wife and the other from a woman who claims she is his common-law wife.

Hardy was described as "grumpy and ugly" in his attitude toward his wife in the separate maintenance suit. She accused him of drinking, gambling and associating with other women, and of once causing her to be confined in a sanitarium against her will.

While she was in the sanitarium, she charged, Hardy caused rumors to be circulated that he had bought "a certain young woman" a home in Westwood and had created a \$12,000 trust fund for her.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Admiral William D. L. Leahy, commander of the battle force, was appointed today by President Roosevelt to succeed Admiral William H. Standley as chief of naval operations when Standley retires on Jan. 1.
