MILK TOAST WITH CHEESE

MRS. W. C. FAUCETTE, Roseburg. 6 slices bread, toasted. 1 quart milk. 1/4 cup grated cheese. Butter toast generously. Warm, not boil milk, season with salt, pepper and cheese. When cheese is melted, pour over toast and serve at once.

BREAKFAST TOAST

MRS. L. E. GILLIAM, Roseburg. Appeals especially to children. Toast bread till brown. Place in pan. Spread well with thick cream. Sprinkle with sugar, a sprinkle of cinnamon if desired. Return to oven till sugar and cream melt, or till crisp as desired.

CINNAMON STRIPS

MRS. LUCILLE CONN, Roseburg. 1/2 cup brown sugar. 2 teaspoons cinnamon. 1/4 cup powdered sugar. Mix thoroughly. Cut bread any amount needed. Remove crust and slice in inch thickness, then cut in inch strips. Roll in melted butter, then thoroughly coat with dry mixture. Bake in moderate oven till brown. 350°.

SYRUP

MRS. DWIGHT C. RITCHIE, Boise, Ida. 1 c brown sugar; 1/2 c hot water; juice of 1 lemon. Mix sugar, water and lemon juice. Bring to a boil. Serve on hotcakes or as desired.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Byron E. Hyatt, 62, mayor of Boise since May, 1935, died today of pneumonia and heart disease.

Hyatt, an accountant, was director of the state bureau of public accounts from 1923 to 1930. He was prominent in the Idaho republican party and in the Masonic lodge.

Surviving are his widow and a daughter, Mrs. Andrew Ernst of Boise.
