

GOLDEN FLOW SET BY MOTOR INDUSTRY

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—(AP)—The motor industry loomed out of the financial news today as a bonafide Santa Claus preparing to distribute many millions of dollars of the fruits of a "good year" to shareholders and workers before Christmas.

The amount to be paid out by two of the industry's "big three"—General Motors and Chrysler—has been raised to more than \$100,000,000 by declaration of a \$5.50 dividend for Chrysler shareholders.

The Chrysler payment, involving \$23,729,150 to about 30,000 stockholders, is due Dec. 14.

Around the same time Chrysler plans to distribute \$4,000,000 to 67,000 workers, its third bonus for employees this year.

A \$150 "year-end" dividend by General Motors calls for distribution of \$65,250,000 to about 250,000 common shareholders, payable Dec. 12.

General Motors' workers, exceeding 200,000, are due for a \$100,000,000 Christmas bonus in addition to a wage increase of 5 cents an hour voted by directors Monday.

Whether the Ford Motor Co., the other member of the "big three," and smaller units would fall in line remained to be seen.

Wall Street statisticians figure most of the motor makers will show earnings for common stock this year and that 1936 dividend payments in the aggregate will top those of 1935, the peak year of automobile production.

Full year profits of the industry are expected to fall short of the 1929 total but the federal surtax upon undistributed earnings has been an incentive to pay out a larger proportion.

The Chrysler dividend, announced late yesterday, was accepted in financial circles as aimed in part to effect distribution of most or all of 1936 profits to avoid the surtax.

It lifted total payments for the year to 12 a share, highest in the corporation's history.

KRNR OPERATION TIME IS EXTENDED

Radio station KRNR was today granted authority to operate on unlimited time, in an order handed down by the Federal Communications Commission, making it possible for the News-Review station to go on the air with evening and night programs in the future.

At present the Roseburg station is operating under rules which limit it broadcasting to daylight hours only, except under special authority. The new order, however, will make it possible to extend the schedule for regular broadcasts, as well as special programs when nighttime service is desired.

The Roseburg station will probably be placed on a schedule from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m. regularly in the near future, according to J. B. Toles, manager.

TRENCH WARFARE ON CAMPUS ADVOCATED

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 12.—(AP)—A suggestion by C. G. Osborn, University of Oregon professor of history with a flair for irony, that military drills on the campus be made realistic by including actual trench warfare, and that it be extended to women students as well, had under-graduates again discussing the question of compulsory ROTC training.

The topic of compulsory drill has been dormant since the defeat at the polls of the bill proposing optional training.

Military training as it now exists on the campus is neither complete nor effective, the professor commented to his classes. Cadets, he pointed out, are taught only how to "dig it out" and not how to "take it."

The professor suggested actual trench combat be included in the ROTC curriculum, along with canteens and trench mouth.

"The Russian and Spanish idea of women soldiers is not so bad," he added. "Girls should be conscripted into battle instead of sitting home knitting."

The Oregon Daily Emerald, undergraduate publication, painted editorially a picture of students sleeping in cold muddy trenches and eating hard tack and "corned willy."
