GRAHAM NUT BREAD
VERA PAYNE, Sutherlin.
MRS. GEO. H. HORTON, Roseburg
MRS. RAY A. NORTON, Roseburg
FRANCES BARKER, Dixonville.
MRS. A. J. RAESS, Glendale
MRS. S. C. WARD, Roseburg
3 cups graham flour
1 cup white flour
2 cups sour milk
1 cup brown sugar
1 t. soda in sour milk
1 t. baking powder
Salt, 1 cup nuts
Makes 1 loaf. Bake 50 to 60 min.

ORANGE LOAF
MISS RITA HOUSER, Roseburg
Rind of 3 medium oranges
1 cup water
1 cup sugar
Remove the bitter white from orange peel. Cut into strips with scissors, then into squares. Add water and cook slowly until tender. Add sugar and cook until clear. Nuts may be added if desired.
For bread use 4 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup shortening, 2 eggs, and 1 cup milk.
Combine mixtures and let stand about fifteen minutes before baking.

PRIZE APPLE PIE
MRS. JOE WINNIFORD, Wilbur.
Make a rich crust. Slice apples thin. Fill crust. Then make a filling of 1/2 c. sugar, 3 T. water, 1 t. flour, a piece of butter size of walnut. Cook mixture till thickens. Stir while cooking. When done pour over apples and put on top crust, and bake in moderate oven. Nice to bake apples and lower crust till nearly done and then pour filling over apples and set back in stove till finished, leaving off top crust.

BUTTERMILK HOTCAKES
MRS. FERN WOOD, Roseburg.
MRS. LELA FERBER, Oakland.
2 cups well sifted flour or 1 cup flour
1/2 cup whole wheat and 1/4 cup corn meal
2 well beaten eggs
2 cups cream buttermilk
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
Mix in baking powder and soda after the other ingredients have been thoroughly mixed.

Variation: Corn Griddle Cakes:
Substitute 1 c. sweet milk (no soda); 4 eggs. Mix as above. Last add 2 T. melted butter, milk and 1 can whole kernel corn. Grease pan with bacon drippings. Fry in small cakes. — Mrs. Elmer E. Bushnell, Lookingglass.

SOUR MILK GRIDDLE CAKES
Mrs. Lela Ferber, Oakland.
Mix and sift 2 1/2 c. flour; 1 t. sugar; 1/2 t. salt and 1/4 t. soda. Add 2 to 4 T. melted butter; 2 c. flour; milk and 1 egg well beaten. Bake on a hot griddle. A handful of corn meal or crisp flakes makes the cakes lighter.
