DUMPLINGS MRS. FANNIE BETTS, Roseburg. 2 cups flour, cake flour is best 4 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon shortening 1/2 cup milk Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Mix shortening with this as for biscuits. Add milk and mix well. Drop by spoonful in chicken broth and boil very slowly about 20 minutes without removing cover.

SOUR MILK DUMPLINGS MRS. LLOYD TROUB, Roseburg. 2 cups sour milk, 1 level teaspoon soda dissolved in a little warm water and 1 teaspoon salt. Stir in the flour and stir as sifted until quite stiff. If you like eggs put in one or two but it is good without. Put 2 level teaspoons baking powder in the sieve while sifting. Take about 3/4 tablespoon of the dough and drop it in the chicken or other meat broth, pepper and cover tightly and cook until done. Cook lively but not too fast.
