

# BARE BACKS, BARE LEGS FROWNED ON

Woman Executive, at 82, Also Decries Smoking and Beer-Drinking.

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruth May Fox at the threshold of 82, says she's no prude—but she can't abide bare backs and bare legs for girls.

As "guardian" of nearly 70,000 young women, she said, she considers such immodesty "one of the greatest temptations for evil."

Mrs. Fox, who crossed the plains by ox team when she was 12, is president of the Young Women's Mutual Improvement association, a Latter Day Saints church group of 69,000 members. She will celebrate her 83rd birthday Monday.

"I don't think the young men care to see girls wearing backless dresses either," asserted the gray-haired mother of 12 children, 10 of whom are still living.

"And, though I don't want to seem prudish, I think girls should refrain also from beer-drinking and smoking.

"Smoking particularly is a filthy habit. If it were just a passing fancy... but once young women indulge themselves they become addicted to the habit."

Believes in Youth.

Mrs. Fox admitted that girls today are stronger-willed than they used to be—"when they want something they want it." But she quickly denied she believed the younger generation is going to the dogs.

"I think we have the finest lot of young people today the world ever knew," she insisted.

She suggested, for the happiness of young people, temperance, the right mental attitude—and not too much advice from their elders.

"Friends and relatives have too many 'don'ts—they're the ones who make you feel old," she said.

And of all the evils, she added, the worst are "babying" the elderly and taking their work away from them.

"I don't know what these old folks are going to do when they are placed on pensions," she mused.
