FAVORITE RECIPES

CORN BREAD

MRS. GEO. W. BURT, Roseburg.
MISS H. MEYER, Roseburg.
1 cup corn meal
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon melted shortening
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 well beaten egg
1 cup thick sour milk or buttermilk

Sift the dry ingredients together. Add the milk to the egg, combine the mixtures. Add the shortening and beat only enough to blend well. Pour into shallow pan and bake in hot oven 25 minutes.

For variation: May add 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice and 1/2 teaspoon soda.

LEMON SPONGE PIE

HAZEL WILSON, Roseburg.
3 egg yolks, beaten until thick; 5 T lemon juice; 1 T grated lemon rind; 1 c sugar; 3 T flour; 1/2 t salt; 1 T melted butter; 1/4 c milk; 3 egg whites. Line pie tin with uncooked pastry. Combine all ingredients, folding in last stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into pie tin and put in hot oven 45°. After 10 min. reduce heat to moderate oven 250° and bake 20 min. longer or until filling is firm. Use your favorite recipe for pastry.

APPLE CRISP DELIGHT

MRS. JOE WINNIFORD, Wilbur.
Peel and core 6 to 8 apples, cut in eighths; 7 T butter (about 1/4 cup); 1 t cinnamon; 1 c sugar; 1/2 c flour (pastry or cake). Butter pie pan. Place apples in pan. Work together the sugar, flour, butter and cinnamon with a pastry blender until crumbly, then pack closely over the apples. (If the apples are very dry add a little water). Bake in hot oven 350° for 30 min. or until filling is firm. Serve warm with whipped cream or lemon sauce.
