FILBERT BREAD

MRS. A. F. MARIOTT, Roseburg.

1/2 cup shortening

1/2 cup sugar

2 eggs

3 large bananas

2 cups flour

1 teaspoon soda

1/2 cup chopped filberts

Cream sugar and shortening, add beaten eggs and crushed bananas.

Sift flour, measure and sift again with the soda. Add to other ingredients and lastly stir in chopped filberts. Bake 40 to 50 minutes in moderate oven, 350°. Makes 1 loaf.

Do not allow to stand over night before cutting.
