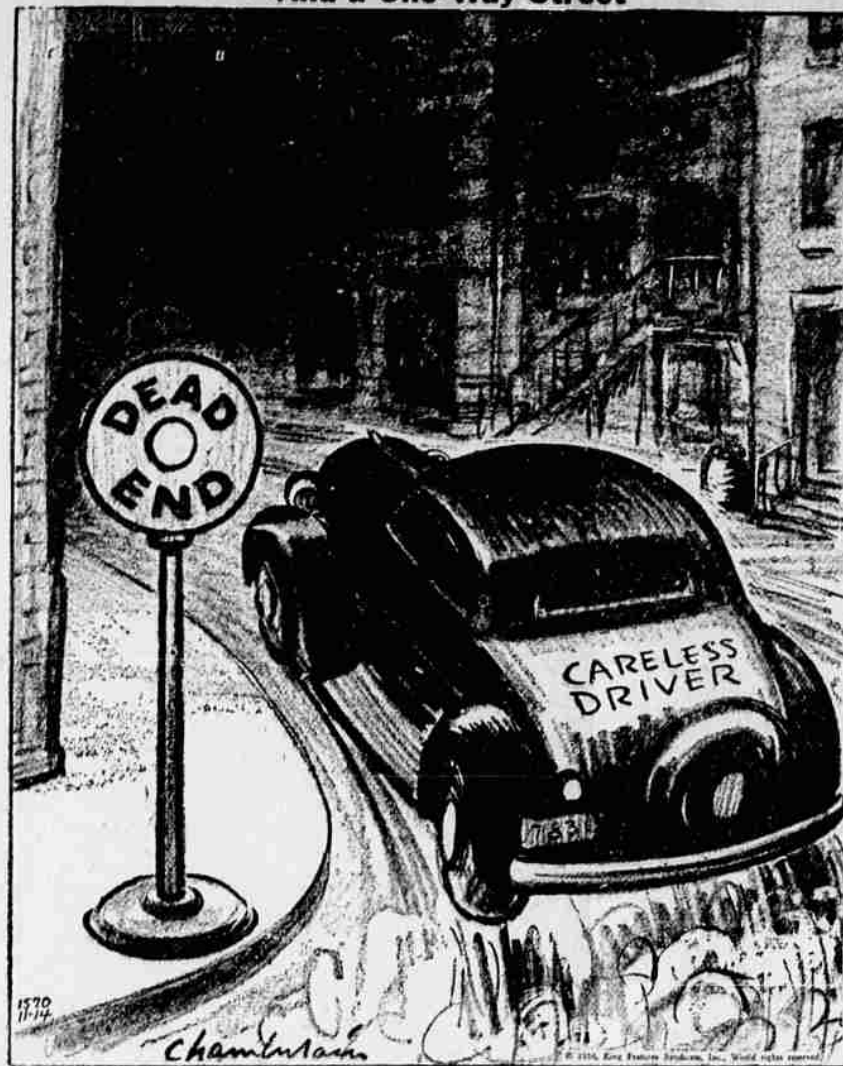

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Jefferson Landslide.

AN OVERWHELMING majority for a president whose administration proved to be very popular with the people is not new in this country. The third president of the United States, Thomas Jefferson, barely elected over his federalist opponent, John Adams, for his first term, was swept into office with a landslide vote for his second term. He lost only 14 electoral votes and those in the very heart of federalist territory.

If we thought there was mud-slinging in the recent campaign we need only to look back to the earliest presidential campaigns to realize that the political battles of today are but tea parties by comparison. They called names and they fought to the death in those days.

But in spite of the fact that Jefferson was literally maligned by the diaphanous during his first term he scored a landslide victory which was not again equaled until the Roosevelt landslide of 1932.

In those days, however, developments and changes were happening thick and fast. It was Jefferson's support in the south and west that won him his first term (plus the political manipulation by Aaron Burr in New York which turned the tide in Jefferson's favor). Then came Madison's bold and unauthorized stroke—the Louisiana purchase from Napoleon who did not have title to the land nor the right to sell it. There were other accomplishments too, in those days they would be called a series of "breaks."

The Louisiana purchase, by the way, doubled the area of the young nation adding the territory which later became the states of Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, the Dakotas, Montana, most of Minnesota and portions of Colorado and Wyoming—all this at a total cost less than the cost of the new bridge across San Francisco Bay!

So Jefferson became very popular and won his second term by a landslide vote.

The country was growing, building and expanding then. Until only recently there has been a frontier, a land of opportunity for those vigorous enough to seize it. There was rapid ebb and flow of public opinion.

With growth ended, with our expansion done, we must be infinitely more careful in the management of our completed and mature country. Though history reveals an apparent parallel we cannot assume too much from it. Our problem of federal government now is vastly different from the situation in Jefferson's time.

The difference between European and American temperaments is shown by our political processions. We believe in capering by a given point with the least resistance and the greatest common denominator. We burn plenty of red fire, given vent to our redolent patriotism in hoarse, progressive yells, and make the welkin ring like a cracked soup dish.

Our parades are really safety valves for political idiosyncrasy. We subscribe to the erroneous but plausible platitude that the country is saved when everybody has sore feet. And not one minute sooner. Nobody is ever hurt in one of our parades. Because it is rarely we know the object of them. The parade may be political or the paraders may be merely breaking in new shoes for their friends.

Therefore, the paraders can act pretty well as they wish, can start out without an object and finish without a destination. All that we ask is that they strut to good swinging marches with the brasses predominant.

Over in Europe the foot is in the other shoe. And both feet aren't mates. There is one thing that Europeans have proved. They have verified it by their rioting and their homicidal retaliation. The European cannot parade in fun.

The Europeans cannot parade in fun. Every newsreel shows Berlin and Moscow tearing off professional throats. All parades are bull-dozing swings around the circuit. They are one lap to the mile and two laps to the frontier.

The European idea of a baby parade is to give each kid a black-jack and let him slap his mammy down.

The European scenario of a beauty parade calls for wheel-chairs and armored tanks, and is performed by poison gases, illuminated with star bombs and culminated with tear gas.

There are not many things of which we are cognizant. But there is one thing that we know. The Europeans cannot parade in fun.

If you want to start trouble in the faience and most reliable way, while combining business with pleasure, don't stop to declare war or issue ultimatums of purest ray anyone. Just get a permit to parade.
