

DIVIDEND STREAM FURTHER ENLARGED

25 Companies Join Parade
of Benefits; Wages and
Bonuses Increase.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17. (AP)—From the headwaters of industrial recovery, many tributaries lead to day the nation's rising stream of purchasing power, including enlarged dividends totaling nearly \$40,000,000 by 25 companies, and more wage boosts and Christmas bonuses.

Kennecott Copper, American Smelting & Refining, General Foods and Coca Cola joined in pushing year-end disbursements to shareholders in a dozen big corporations the past fortnight above \$200,000,000.

Many thousands of shareholders in nearly all sectors of industry were in line for extra and increased payments before Christmas.

The cotton textile industry, swept by the biggest cloth and yarn buying boom veterans have seen in years, raised wages over a broad front.

Pay boost announcements by leading mills in the south and New England were accepted by some textile men as indicating a general increase for the industry's 134,000 workers, with an annual payroll totaling between \$275,000,000 and \$300,000,000 at the current rate of operations.

Many mills announced 10 per cent increases.

Previously the autumn wage increase tide had swept over the steel, woolen and worsted, meat packing and parts of the rubber, motor and miscellaneous machine, turbine industries, lifting payrolls for more than 1,000,000 workers by upwards of \$100,000,000 annually.

Bonuses by leading corporations went above \$25,000,000 as General Foods, Corn Products, and J. I. Case threshing joined such companies as Chrysler and General Motors in filling the Christmas pay envelopes of thousands of workers with extra dollars.

Aside from an extra dividend on the common of \$2, totaling \$7, 983,800, Coca Cola directors voted an additional month's salary for employees "in recognition of the company's fiftieth anniversary."

PORTLAND LAWYER DISBARRED FOR YEAR

SALEM, Nov. 11. (AP)—The Oregon supreme court suspended Albert Eastman, Portland attorney, from practicing law in Oregon for one year on charges of "serious misconduct" in a written opinion by Justice George Rossmann, handed down today.

The complaint against Eastman was filed by the grievance committee of the Oregon state bar on six findings against him. The bar's report recommended the year's suspension.

Eastman was an independent candidate for state senator from Multnomah county at the recent general election.

F. R. SPENDS \$670 ON HIS REELECTION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (AP)—President Roosevelt reported today his reelection cost him exactly \$670.

His personal campaign expenditures statement, written in his own hand, listed one contribution of \$150 to the town committee of Hyde Park, N. Y., during the last month of the campaign. The only other expenditure noted in his post-election report was \$10 for "additional postage."

An earlier report had recorded another \$10 for postage and a \$500 donation to Duchess county, New York, democratic committee. He reported he had received no contributions.

Robert Jefferys, secretary of the special senate committee investigating campaign spending, said he had not yet received a report from Governor Alf M. Landon, republican presidential nominee, but he understood "most of his expenses were borne by the republican national committee."

Two other presidential candidates, however, have turned in their personal expenditures accounts. William Lemke, union party nominee, spent \$2,866 and received contributions totaling \$5,753, committee records showed.

The prohibition party candidate, Dr. Leigh Colvin, listed expenditures of \$1,106 and donations of \$1,131.
