FRUIT AND NUTS BREAD
MRS. A. W. BASHFORD, Roseburg
2 cups graham flour
1 1/2 cups white flour (Unipqua Chief)
2 cups sweet milk
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup molasses
1 cup chopped walnuts
1 cup cut-up dates
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
Bake rather slowly 1 hour.

CORN BREAD
MRS. C. A. SUMMERS, Dixonville
MRS. E. BRADFORD, Roseburg
MRS. JULIUS SINDT, Melrose
1 cup flour
1/2 cup corn meal
2 cup sugar
3 t. baking powder
1 or 2 eggs
1/4 t. salt
1 cup sweet milk
2 or 3 T. shortening, melted
Mix dry ingredients, then mix liquids and add to dry. Bake in greased hot oven about 20 min.
