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Eat More Turkey.

IN JACKSON COUNTY the chamber of commerce has launched a drive to induce Rogue River valley residents to eat turkey before Thanksgiving as a means of aiding the turkey growers. Jackson county, it seems, has an unusually large turkey crop.

The Medford Mail-Tribune approves the turkey eating campaign with the following editorial comment:

"The present turkey population of Jackson county is estimated at 60,000. This means nearly two turkeys for every man, woman and child in the county. Because of a bumper turkey crop in Oregon and the country at large, the turkey price has been depressed, and the maritime strike, by shutting off boat shipments, has reduced the normal demand. Turkey growers in the valley, therefore, face a serious predicament. Unless local consumption can be increased, many of them stand to suffer a severe loss on their 1936 crop. The Thanksgiving demand is fixed and cannot be materially increased. But the chamber of commerce has hit upon a way out, by instituting a series of 'turkey weeks' between now and Christmas. During this period, appeals will be made to all and sundry to eat as much turkey as their pocketbooks and appetites allow."

The campaign to get people right here at home to eat more turkey is mighty sensible in more ways than one.

Unfortunately for turkey producers the royal bird is considered a luxury. At present retail market prices turkey meat is just about the same price as other meats. Here, for instance, are retail prices quoted by one Roseburg market today:

Turkey, number 1.....25c to 27c lb.
Medium.....24c
Number 2.....22c
Duck roast.....18c
Veal roast.....25c
Pork roast.....22c

So it is not extravagant to serve turkey any day in the week. There is no need to eat aside Thanksgiving and Christmas as the only two days in the year to afford turkey. Douglas county people, located right at the source of the turkey supply should certainly take advantage of that fortunate situation and eat more turkey. The more turkey we eat the less there will be to ship out and the stronger the market will become in consequence. Let's all eat turkey to-morrow, what say?

EMPLOYERS URGED TO ACT PROMPTLY

Social Security Register Cards Should be Filed Early, P. M. States.

The early return of registration cards of employers who are registering under the provisions of the federal social security act is urged by Postmaster Lester L. Wimberly, of Roseburg. It is necessary, he states, that the application blanks be returned to the post office by November 21st in order that application blanks for employees be prepared for delivery beginning on November 24th. Recent information received by the postmaster indicates that it is very important that every question on the blanks be answered in a definite manner and not by the use of check marks, except where indicated, or by the use of lines drawn through the space for answer. If answers are omitted or not properly answered the blanks will be returned for correction. It is preferred that blanks be filled in by typewriter or plainly printed by hand but must in all cases be signed and the relationship of the signer to the firm indicated.

When blanks for the registration of employees are distributed, beginning November 24th, employers are urged to get all of their employees registered as soon as possible and it is important and absolutely necessary that every question on the blanks be given a

one hand. Then we emerged into a fertile valley, which continued for some miles, and then, still ending steadily upwards, the bare rocky peaks began to show with dense clustering pinewoods at their base. "Come, mon ami," he said to me. "Let us go down and sit upon the terrace and enjoy the sunlight."

"You think that wise?" I asked.

He shrugged his shoulders.

The sunlight was marvelous—in fact the glare was almost too great for me. We had some creamy coffee instead of tea, then went up to the right of the hotel, our few belongings. Poirot was in his most unapproachable mood, lost in a kind of reverie. Once or twice he shook his head and sighed.

I had been rather intrigued by a man who had got out of our train at Bolzano, and had been met by a private car. He had been a small man, and the thing about him that had attracted my attention was that he was almost as much muffled up as Poirot had been. More so, indeed for in addition to great coat and muffler, he was wearing huge blue spectacles. I was convinced that here we had an emissary of the Big Four. Poirot did not seem very impressed by my idea, but when, leaning out of my bedroom window, I reported that the man in question was strolling about in the vicinity of the hotel, he admitted that there might be something in it.

I urged my friend not to go down to dinner, but he insisted on doing so. We entered the dining-room rather late, and were shown to a table by the window. As we sat down, our attention was attracted by an exclamation and a crash of falling china. A dish of vegetables had been upset over a man who was sitting at the table next to ours.

The head waiter came up and was vociferous in apologies.

Presently, when the offending waiter was serving us with soup, Poirot spoke to him.

"An unfortunate accident, that. But it was not your fault."

"Monsieur saw that? No, indeed it was not my fault. The gentleman half sprang up from his chair—I thought he was going to have an attack of some kind. I could not help the catastrophe."

I saw Poirot's eyes shining with the green light I knew so well, and as the waiter departed he said to me in a low voice:—

"You see, Hastings, the effect of Hercule Poirot—alive and in the flesh?"

"You think—"

I had not time to continue. I felt Poirot's hand on my knee, as he whispered excitedly:—

"Look, Hastings, look. His trick with the bread! Number Four!"

Anyone desiring any information regarding the use of the blanks may secure it by coming to the post office, telephoning the office, or, if necessary, a postal employee will go to business places to assist in properly completing the applications. Mr. Wimberly says.

The postal service is charged only with registration of employers and employees and with the interpretation of the law or a decision as to who does or does not come under the provisions of the act, he explains. Instructions are given that if there is any doubt as to registration of either employer or employee that they should register and decisions regarding their status will be made by the treasury department, whose duty it is to administer the act. Employers are reminded that the Social Security act is a federal law and must be complied with by all persons who employ one or more persons, under sixty-five years of age, except certain exempted businesses and occupations.

Any employers who have not already been located by the postal service and provided with forms may secure them at the post office. Request, by telephone or letter will be taken care of at once.
