

INDIANS BATTLING SPRINGFIELD TODAY

Final Conference Football Game to Be Followed by Clash With Alumni.

The Roseburg senior high school Indians left this afternoon for Springfield to play the final conference football game of the season. Badly crippled by injuries, the Indians were facing a tough battle as they lined up on the Springfield gridiron this afternoon.

Pete Rutter, ace halfback, is out of the game with an injured arm, while Fritz, end, is unable to play because of an ankle injury. Ridge-way, hefty center, is still suffering from a nose infection, but may see service in part of the battle.

Although today's game will complete the high school schedule for the year, the Indians will be seen in one more home game, a post-season battle with an alumni team. The game will be played Wednesday night, Nov. 25, on Friday field, and local fans are assured of a most interesting battle.

The alumni team will be composed of players from the teams of the past two years, with two or more who have had some college training since leaving high school.

Bill Schermer, who has been assisting Coach Hot Turner during the season, will be in the lineup with the high school team. Schermer was the outstanding player of last year's squad.

The alumni team has been practicing regularly and is reported to be in good condition and ready to give the Indians plenty of competition.

ganzed vigilante committees, and it was these vigilante committees that kept the peace in the wide open spaces.

"The vigilantes," Linsey Sizemore says, "were loosely bound together all over the cattle country, and they acted more or less in cooperation with each other."

"They had a regular letterhead, printed, and these letterheads were used in a way that was well understood. Nobody ever threw one of these letters into the waste basket unopened."

"When a stranger arrived in the country, his business was not asked and little curiosity was openly displayed regarding his past and where he came from and why. That wasn't regarded as good form. But strangers were watched."

"If they conducted themselves well and lived up to their obligations and made their word good and generally acted as good citizens, should according to the code of the times, they came to be accepted by the right kind of people. But if they acted suspiciously, especially if they absented themselves at more or less regular intervals without a good reason, they were watched more closely still, and if they persisted in their suspicious activities they got a vigilante letter."

"The letter gave them two days to leave the country."

"UP IN the Prineville section, two men had failed to live up to the requirements of the law, adding people of that time, and so they got a vigilante letter. They disregarded it."

"Two days later, their bodies swung from a bridge over the

Crooked river. "When the vigilantes acted, they meant business."

REMEMBER, please, that this was then a big country, thinly settled, and law and order was a long way off. Property was largely represented by cattle and horses, and if the owners of stolen cattle and horses waited until the distant authorities could be notified and then could reach the trouble spot, the stolen animals and the thieves would be beyond reach.

It was conditions such as these that brought the vigilantes into being, and while they acted without formal warrant of law they really represented law and order in the cattle country.

The vigilantes of that early time were about as far from the mobs of today, which sometimes take the law into their own hands, as one pole is from the other.

BEARS FAVORED TO DEFEAT STANFORD

42nd Annual Grid Battle Occurs Saturday; OSC to Play U. of O.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—(AP)—It's the big game at Berkeley tomorrow — Stanford's Indians vs. the Golden Bears of California — and though no championship is at stake \$2,000 will pack Memorial stadium for the 42nd annual football battle.

The only other conference game is at Corvallis, where University of Oregon and Oregon State college wind up their seasons in the yearly "civil war" which this year is a fight to keep out of the Pacific coast conference basement.

Only once in the last 12 years have the Bears whipped Stanford. Last season the Indians deprived California of the championship, winning 13 to 0 at Palo Alto for the Bears' only defeat.

Though their records each show as many losses as victories, the Bears are favored at odds of about 10 to 9 through experience and their brilliant showing in another Oregon, 28 to 0, last Saturday. California has won three games and lost three; Stanford lost two, tied two and won two.

Stanford appeared nearly on a par with conference-leading Washington by tying the Huskies, 14 to 14, two weeks ago, but the Indians had difficulty last Saturday with stubborn Oregon State, pulling out a 29 to 14 win with a last-minute rally.

Mainly because of their showing in that game, Oregon State's Bears will be favored to dump Oregon for its sixth conference loss.

Oregon has scored only seven points in conference competition. That was the 7 to 7 tie with Stanford. Oregon State upset Washington State 16 to 6 two weeks ago.

In other far western skirmishes North Dakota State skullduggies University of Idaho's Vandals at Moscow, Ida., and University of San Francisco takes on Montana's Grizzlies at Butte, Mont.

WILLAMETTE HAS EASY GAME TONIGHT

(By the Associated Press) Willamette's Bearcats, paced by Fullback Dick Weisgerber, can win the northwest football conference title tonight at Salem by defeating Pacific university in the only weekend league game.

The Bearcats, undefeated, untied and unscored on in league play, are overwhelming favorites to conquer the Pacific gridmen, whose only victory this season came last week against the cellar-dwelling Albany Pirates, who have not scored a point this season.

Weisgerber has scored 79 points in the eight games in which his team has played, and leads all scorers in the far west.
