FAVORITE RECIPES

SANDWICH SPREAD

MRS. L. R. DRYSON, Roseburg.
MRS. C. M. STIERWALT, Roseburg.
4 quarts green tomatoes
3 quarts cabbage
1 quart onion
2 stalks celery
4 red or green peppers, large
sweet

Grind through coarse meat chopper. Blend together in large kettle, stirring in $\frac{1}{4}$ cup salt. Put in oil and drain overnight. In morning add enough diluted vinegar to moisten and cook until tender. Then add 6 cups vinegar, 3 cups brown sugar and spices as follows: cinnamon, mustard, seed and pepper. Cook until seasoning is well mixed. Drain off excess liquid and put in jars. Cover with paraffin. This is very good mixed with mayonnaise as a sandwich spread.

SANDWICH SPREAD

MRS. GUY OGLESBY, Roseburg.
Chop 14 medium sized cucumbers, 1 quart sliced onions, 6 peppers, chopped fine. $\frac{1}{4}$ cup salt. Let stand over night. In the morning cover with vinegar and scald. Combine $\frac{1}{2}$ cup butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 quart vinegar, 3 cups sugar, and 4 well beaten eggs. Cook until smooth. Add 1 cup sweet cream and 1 teaspoon mustard. Mix well with vegetables and seal in jars while hot. This is delicious and keeps indefinitely.

CCC PARK WORK IN OREGON NARRATED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Robert Fechner, emergency conservation director, said today the civilian conservation corps has either completed or started development projects in nine major units and 42 minor units of the Oregon state park system.

Work of the CCC in state parks is supervised by the national park service in cooperation with state authorities.

Oregon's parks embrace a total area of 12,553 acres.

"The development in Oregon state parks previously was confined to roads and trails and facilities for swimming and picnicking," Fechner said.

"Recently, however, the state park department decided to install camping accommodations in some of the larger parks. Park signs, community kitchens, comfort stations and similar structures have been built."

The CCC, Fechner said, has carried on work projects in Cape Sebastian, Humboldt mountains, Jessie M. Honeyman, Ecola and Saddle mountain state parks on the coast, Silver Creek falls park on the eastern edge of the Willamette valley, and Emigrant springs, Shelton and Battle mountain parks in eastern Oregon.

The existing program is being carried out by six CCC camps. Five other camps have been located so far to be able to carry on projects on small state park properties, such as Cape Arago and Devil's Punch Bowl parks on the coast and Wycat and Talbot parks on the Columbia river.

One camp is now at work developing Prescott park, Medford's 1,700-acre metropolitan park area. Benson and McLaughlin parks on the Columbia river were developed for Portland. Coos Head park on the coast for the Marshfield-North Bend metropolitan park board.

LEGITIMIZING AIM OPPOSED AT VATICAN

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Pope Pius invehived sharply today against proposed changes in the Italian civil code which would legitimize children born out of wedlock.

Receiving 118 newly-wed couples, the holy father was quoted by the authoritative Vatican newspaper, Osservatore Romano, as saying: "These innovations are called daring. But to us, as the supreme pastor of souls, they seem not only daring and audacious but truly menacing."

The pontiff added: "It is affirmed that the innovations would be proposed in order to improve the heritage of the supervising spouse and for humanitarian understanding in the consideration of natural children—they would not be called illegitimate but natural."

"It seems to us that in crude but exact language this would tend to put the legitimate family on a level with the illegitimate family."

EILERS NARRATES BOYHOOD EVENTS

Speaking on the subject, "Lost on the Range," last evening at the First Baptist church, Leonard Eilers told of a boyhood experience, on the South Dakota prairie, when he and his brother, astride their little Indian pony, left their neighborhood home, one dark night, and got lost on the prairie. Finally remembering that they had been told to let a horse have his head in a case of this kind, the pony finally brought them safely to their own homestead. He likened their plight to humanity in general, lost on the range of life apart from Christ.

"Just as we trusted ourselves to that pony, so must we trust ourselves to Christ to bring us safely home," he said.

He told also of a young man who lived only about two miles from town, and who went to town one day. A blizzard was threatening, he was warned by a storekeeper that he had better get home; but he just laughed. "Oh, there's plenty of time. I'll get home all right." Then when he did start, the blizzard was raging. They found his body two days later within fifty feet of his home. He was so near, yet lost. "So it is with man," said the speaker. "They laugh and shrug their shoulders. There is plenty of time; but they may be almost saved, and yet lost."
