

CENTRAL OREGON IN GRIP OF ARIDITY

BEND, Nov. 19—(AP)—Clouds hovering over the Cascade range in central Oregon have vanished and the region once more faces one of the driest seasons on record.

The mountains, frequently blanketed at this time of the year, are without snow. Several large glaciers on the Three Sisters have become so small they are barely visible from here.

Bend has had but 1.57 inches of rainfall since June.

The range country is dry and brown, but stockmen said they were well supplied with hay for winter feeding.
