In order to avoid conflict with the Thanksgiving union church service scheduled for Wednesday night, the football game scheduled between Roseburg senior high Indians and an alumni team was advanced today to Tuesday night. The game will be played at Finlay field, starting at 8 o'clock, it was announced today.

The change was made when the churches of the city announced a union Thanksgiving service for Wednesday night, the school and alumni teams agreeing to change their date to avoid conflicting with the church program.

Football fans are anticipating a good game, as the Indians will be faced by a team made up of heavy and experienced players, most of whom have been practicing regularly and are in good condition.

The alumni team will have a strong line with Fletcher Gardner, Ned Robertson and Jip Henbest in end positions. Howard Hatfield and "Stub" Parker, tackles; Ernie Gardner and Tom Pargeter, guards, and John Baehner, reserve. In the backfield will be Waldo Campbell, "Iiggs" Reese, Ronald Faulkner, "Toots" Zenor, Elmer Hill and Pete Neal.

All of the players have been outstanding in high school play during the past two years, and have been practicing together this season to build up plays which are expected to give the Indians plenty of trouble.
