

FILM TARZAN AND NAVY OFFICER CLASH

Lieut. Winslow Wears Bad Eye, Result of Contact With Weismuller.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—(AP)—The mystery of who socked whom and why at the Stork club last night, a mild drama revolving about Johnny (Tarzan) Weismuller, of the films, and Lieutenant Cameron Winslow Jr., of the U. S. navy and social register, and son of the late Rear Admiral Winslow, was solved today as the boys of the Broadway beat rose to face the afternoon sunshine.

Mrs. Natalie Hess Winslow, former Los Angeles debutante, heartily explaining one side of the argument, said her husband's left eye was completely closed, and black and blue from one of Weismuller's left hooks.

She said Lieutenant Winslow also needed a couple of stitches to close a wound in his eyebrow before he returned to duty aboard the receiving ship Seattle at the Brooklyn navy yard.

But attaches at the night club had a different version, which went like this:

Weismuller, according to Leonard McElin, former Columbia university oarsman speaking for the Stork club, arrived there with a party of guests about midnight.

The guests were Mr. and Mrs. James McKinley Bryant and Virgil Moore, also prominent socially, and a man identified as Weismuller's theatrical agent.

They had been to a party, and on the way to the club, had put on dark glasses, agreeing meanwhile that the first to take them off must forfeit \$50 to the remainder of the party.

Weismuller got up to dance with Mrs. Bryant, so McElin said, and in so doing passed the table where Lieutenant Winslow sat with his wife, the former Natalie Hess, of Los Angeles. Then the mild fireworks opened up.

"Why don't you take off those glasses," McElin quoted Winslow as asking.

"It's just a gag," Johnny explained, and took time out to tell the officer about the wager.

"Well then why don't you get a haircut?" McElin says Winslow insisted, and that seemed too much for Weismuller, who has just completed another Tarzan picture, to bear.

"Why don't you come outside," was his answer, or so McElin says, and the action speeded up.

Apparently they never did get outside. Walters moved in with something of the flying wedge that used to make Jack's famous. There was a flurry of punches. McElin says Weismuller threw none, that Winslow did a small amount of catching, nothing serious.

In fact it seemed an entirely scoreless boxing—no runs, no hits, no errors, and all left.

JACKSON COUNTY JURY INDICTS SIX

MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 24.—(AP)—Six indictments—three of them secret—were returned by the Jackson county grand jury, which filed a report with the circuit court today.

Martin McCaskey of Gold Hill was charged in a true bill with unlawful assault and battery upon H. B. Duncan, Medford attorney, several weeks ago.

During the present session, the grand jury also returned a true bill charging Maurice J. French with manslaughter, and Lester Messal with failure to stop following an auto accident.

The indictment against French was based upon an auto accident on the Pacific highway last September, near the Jackson hot springs, when Miss Edith Barry of Lakeview, Ore., was killed, when the auto driven by French left the highway and crashed into a power line pole, the district attorney said.

The indictment against Messal was based upon the death of Everett J. Thompson, a highway pedestrian, who was killed on the night of September 13, last, when apparently struck by an auto driven by Messal.

No findings were reported by the grand jury in its inquiry into the death last summer of Avis Brood, 14, Central Point girl bicyclist, who was killed when struck by an auto driven by Z. J. Riggs of Hillsboro, and former Salem druggist. A coroner's jury had previously held Riggs blameless.

The girl, riding a bicycle, was struck and killed by an auto on the Pacific highway and Main street intersection in Central Point.

Messal was arraigned this morning and was granted until Friday to enter a plea.

LOYAL DOG KILLED TO GET MAN'S BODY

BEDFORD, Ia., Nov. 24.—(AP)—A searching party found the body of John Clark, 49, Athlestan, Ia., trapper, buried in a cave-in skunk den early today and his dog frantically trying to dig Clark out of the death trap he had fallen into.

Startling a vicious warning, the dog, a German shepherd, held off the searchers, headed by Athlestan's mayor, C. M. King, as they tried to drive him away so they could dig out Clark's body. Finally a bullet stretched the dog dead across the mound of earth.

"We hated to kill that dog," said Mayor King, "for he was only trying to protect Clark. He'd dug out Clark's legs all by himself. But it was the only way we could get to the trapper's body. He we'd known Clark was dead we'd have taken time to rope the dog."

Search for Clark was started last night when he failed to return home. Barking of his dog led the searching party to the stream bank skunk den in the lonely hills.
