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Prizes and Peace.

A SWEDISH scientist Alfred Nobel, the inventor of dynamite, died December 19, 1896, bequeathing a trust fund of \$9,000,000, the interest of which should yearly be distributed to those who had mostly contributed to the benefit of mankind during the preceding year. The amount of the prizes has varied from year to year with the interest yield from the investments of the fund. In 1936 the prize was \$46,500 to each of five winners in the various classifications. The prize for 1936 amounts to \$49,303; for 1935, \$39,258.

Nobel prizes are awarded annually for outstanding contributions to mankind in the fields of physics, chemistry, medicine, literature and peace.

The peace prizes for the years 1935 and 1936 were announced yesterday. It is both interesting and significant that the award of the prize for 1936 to the Argentine foreign minister, Lamas, comes on the very eve of the inter-American peace conference which will be attended by President Roosevelt.

There has been strife in South America. The peace prize was awarded for the work done by Lamas in settling the Chaco war. Representatives of 21 nations will sit around the peace conference table. The meeting will be presided over by Saavedra Lamas who has just been named the one man in the world who has done the most toward the promotion of peace and goodwill during the current year. A peace conference under such leadership should be productive of excellent results.

The presence of the President of the United States will add definite prestige to the meeting and is indicative of a definite effort henceforth to promote peace among our neighbors. There seems some hope of continued peace in the western hemisphere but, alas, even in the News-Review issue in which this is printed will be found news dispatches from the European continent indicating the gathering of war clouds.

If some method could be devised, or some prize offered, which would inspire such world figures as Hitler, Mussolini, Stalin and others to rival one another in contributing toward world peace, there might be some hope. Apparently a prize of thirty or forty thousand dollars does not interest them.

first was to kill the Chinaman."

"LUCK ran against Vickers, and he lost his 20 chips in short order. So he made good—shot the Chinese cook, dragged him at the end of a rope to a pile of rocks and there buried him. Then he lit out of Idaho.

"That is how he came to Oregon. He went back to cow punching, and among others he worked for my father."

"NOW that killing of the Chinaman in Idaho was about as cold-blooded a deed as you could imagine. But I maintain that Bill Vickers wasn't ALL BAD.

"For instance: He'd worked for my father quite a while, and hadn't drawn any of his wages. He finally had about \$400 coming to him, so he drew it and started to San Francisco to spend the winter in the city.

"On the way, somewhere up in the Sierras, he ran onto a man and his wife who were clear down on their luck—out of money, out of food, outfit all gone and both about starved. This bad man who'd killed the Chinaman up in Idaho spent his \$400 getting that man and his wife back on their feet again, and then he turned

around and came back to the ranch and went to work.

"Figure that out, if you can."

BILL VICKERS, Joe relates, died with his boots on, as so many of his kind did. A United States marshal came after him in the course of time, and in the fight that ensued when the marshal came up with Vickers, along with a wild young fellow named Grinkey who'd teamed up with him, the marshal came out on top.

Both he buried, beneath the same heap of stones, on the Guano ranch, over beyond the Hart mountain country.

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ADVICE ON SCHOOL PERMITS OFFERED

Graduates of standard two-year courses at Oregon normal schools, who wish to secure certificates on the basis of such graduation, will need to make application to the state department of education before January 1, according to Mrs. Edith Ackert, county school superintendent.

Starting January 1, the amount of training required for an Oregon elementary certificate will be advanced to include a full term of twelve weeks of professional training in addition to the completion of a standard two-year normal course.

Persons who apply for elementary certificates after the first of the year will be required by law to meet the advanced qualifications.

Under the regulations of the state department of education, the holder of a one-year certificate, based on standard normal school graduation, who fails to teach long enough during the life of such certificate to be eligible for a five-year paper, can secure another one-year certificate upon application.
